Keep fires at bay with proper tree maintenance

How?

- Remove any trees that are sick, dying and have excessive deadwood
- Remove, or trim to 3 inches flammable undergrowth and woody debris
 - Remove vines, papery bark and hanging debris

Examples of highly flammable trees are:

Acacia

Eucalyptus

Fir

Pine

Spruce

Be especially vigilant in maintenance of these plantings

Fire Safe Marin (<u>www.firesafemarin.org</u>) has a complete listing of flammable trees and shrubs—consult that site for more information



DRAFT JUNE TREE TIP OF THE MONTH

Be water-wise to help your trees survive the drought.

- Provide the right amount of water. Water young trees 2x per week & mature trees once a week.
- Water early in the morning or after the sun has set as this replaces the water they've lost during the day.
- Deep water is essential. Do not give small amounts of water as it encourages shallow roots that dry quickly.
- Water directly with a hose, 5-gallon bucket or gator bag filled with recycled water rather than a sprinkler.
- Consider recycled water or gray water from your home. Water collected in a bucket from the shower is an option.
- Water in the "drip-zone" those areas directly beneath the foliage and shaded by the tree.
- Avoid directly irrigating the trunk of the tree as the increased moisture can favor root rot disease.

Draft Alternative JuneTree Tip of the Month

Tree health issues may occur this spring as a result of the drought.

- browning or loss of needles on evergreens
- possible discoloration and wilting on deciduous trees as leaves emerge
- damage to roots, twigs, and branches
- cracks or splits in bark
- poor growth

The stress could make your trees prone to longterm damage and insect or disease infestations.

Consider having your trees inspected by a professional to identify and determine treatment.
