Free Lawn Area and Chair Rules and Regulations

Each year the free Jazz & Blues by the Bay concert series becomes more and more popular attracting greater crowds. In order to ensure that it is a positive experience for all, the following rules and regulations have been adopted for the free lawn seating area:

- Chair seats may be no taller than 8" from the ground
- Chair backs may be no taller than the shoulder height of the occupant (no exceptions)
- Tables may be no taller than 18"
- Rocks used to hold blankets in place must be returned
- Please use only the space you need
- Areas between reserved tables are off limits for blankets. Any blankets placed in these areas will be removed
- Please make space for others. Let's all have a good time!
- Please do not park on Spinnaker Way in the red zone, or you will be cited and towed.

The purpose of the Parks and Recreation Commission is to make recommendations to, and advise, the Council in all matters of policy pertaining to the creation, operation, maintenance, management and control of all parks, playgrounds, community recreation programs and activities, and to administer and supervise such plans and programs as are approved by the City Council.

The Parks and Recreation Commission meets regularly at 6:30 PM on the third Wednesday of each month. The Parks and Recreation Commission consists of five members appointed by the City Council. Each member is appointed for a three year term. The primary responsibility of the Commission is to advise the City Council on development and maintenance of the City's parks and on broad-based recreation programs. Commissioners also volunteer and participate in variety of special events sponsored by the Sausalito Parks & Recreation Department such as the annual Easter Parade, Fourth of July Celebration, Halloween Parade and Chili Cook-Off. The Commission has also been very successful in promoting and receiving input on various recreation services from the public and advises the Parks & Recreation Department based on the community's feedback.

Members of the City of Sausalito's Boards and Commissions provide an invaluable service to our City by advising the City Council and City staff on a wide variety of policy matters. The detailed studies and considered advice of Boards and Commissions are often catalysts for innovative programs and improved services. Without the assistance of the various Boards and Commissions, the City Council would only be able to give limited review to many complex issues.

Serving on a Board or Commission can also be rewarding for community-minded residents. It is an excellent way to participate in local government and to make a personal contribution to the improvement of our community. The SWCSRF is a 501(c)(3) non-profit; donations are tax-deductible.

The SWCSRF has been awarding scholarships for higher education to deserving students from Sausalito and Marin City since 1956. To date nearly \$900,000 has been awarded, with a goal of \$1 million in scholarships to the community by the end of 2016-2017.



Ice House Plaza Project Progresses

There is no stopping Sausalitans bent on bettering our community. We have prevented the State of California from building Highway 101 on fill east of our shoreline, rejected a smelly fish cannery and reclaimed downtown Sausalito from the stranglehold of corrupt gambling interests. The Ice House Plaza project builds on that historic legacy and honors some of the citizen activists who have left an indelible imprint on Sausalito.

Led by the late Phil Frank, a tireless champion of Sausalito history and a beloved community member, citizens donated money so that the Ice House building could be moved from Caledonia Street to downtown Sausalito to serve as a local history museum and visitor center.

Those citizens also envisioned creating an adjoining Ice House Plaza. The Sausalito Foundation began fundraising for the plaza following Phil Frank's death, as his friends and fellow citizens sought to use funds donated in his memory to build a project that Phil would have loved.

The Ice House Plaza project stalled when the Sausalito Foundation founder Bea Seidler became ill and passed away in 2014. Like Phil, Bea was someone who made enormous contributions to Sausalito. Under her leadership, the Foundation raised funds to purchase offshore lots slated for development. The vast majority of public art in Sausalito---from the Sea Lion Statue to paintings in City Hall---were purchased by the Foundation. Bea was also one of the founding Ice House docents.

In late 2014, the Foundation enlisted the Sausalito Historical Society to take on fundraising for the project. Once again, the citizens of Sausalito are rising to the challenge. By March 2016, Sausalito citizens have donated over two-thirds of the project costs. Major donors include the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation and the Lions, Rotary and Woman's Clubs.

Project Description

The Ice House Plaza will serve multiple purposes: a place for the public to linger while enjoying the downtown historic district; an outdoor classroom for the Historical Society's acclaimed local history curricula for Sausalito Marin City School District third grade students; and a venue for docent talks.

Landscaping with native plants will create a "learning landscape" for the 3rd graders to study plants used by the Miwoks and also for home gardeners to find out more about attractive, drought-tolerant plants suitable for Sausalito.

The new plaza design also acknowledges the site's history as the site of the former passenger rail line with the addition of an allegorical train tracks outlined in tile on the plaza, crossed by redwood benches symbolizing railroad ties.

The City and Historical Society have applied for State grant funds for future interpretive exhibits, including replicas of historic Sausalito artifacts imbedded into the concrete benches to encourage exploration by children.

Thanks a TON, Sausalito! An article by the Sausalito Sustainability Commission

Have you noticed you've lost weight?

You may not know this, but thanks to the diligent efforts of Sausalito residents and businesses over the last four years, our city has lost 813 tons—of garbage going to the landfill. That's an impressive number for a small city like ours, and one we should be proud of.

How did we do it? Well, much of Sausalito's recent waste reduction has come through food waste composting.

Over the years, Marinites have done a fantastic job of recycling their waste. In fact, Marin residents collectively recycle 75 percent of their trash—effectively diverting thousands of tons of garbage from the landfill.

So, what's left in our garbage? A lot of food waste. In a recent waste study of Sausalito, we found that over 75 percent of the residential and commercial waste stream still remains potentially recyclable or compostable.

In 2012, the City of Sausalito joined the rest of the Marin County in promoting food waste composting. At that time, Bay Cities Refuse, the city's garbage hauler, began accepting food scraps and yard waste in the greencycle carts.

Since then, Sausalito has reduced the amount of garbage going to the landfill from 4,205 to 3,392 tons—a 19 percent reduction in just four years. During the same period, Sausalito's greencycling has steadily increased from 1,322 to 2,034 tons per year—a 53 percent increase.

What's even better is that much of Sausalito's food and yard waste is recycled into rich compost that residents can use – for free – in their yards and gardens, courtesy of Bay Cities Refuse and the City of Sausalito. In the spring, simply stop by the MLK property off of Coloma Street behind the tennis courts with your own container, and take some local nutrient-rich compost home with you.

What goes into the greencycling bins? All of your leftovers, food scraps and yard waste. This includes coffee grounds, egg shells, cooked and uncooked meat and bones, pizza crusts and cardboard pizza boxes, wet or soiled paper and cardboard, spoiled fruit and vegetables and more. For a helpful guide, visit Zero Waste Marin at www.ZeroWasteMarin.org.

To help make it easier for you to lose even more weight in your trash, Sausalito Sustainability Commission members will be handing out free rolls of "bio bags" and a limited supply of kitchen compost buckets—perfect for countertops or under the sink—and free magnets with information on what can be composted in Sausalito at events throughout the year. An evaluation of this pilot Fellowship will determine whether this opportunity will be offered in the following years to anyone in their 20's interested in Japan and this experience.

The Sausalito Historical Society (SHS)

We are a group of friends, neighbors, colleagues, local merchants, scholars, writers, artists, historians, history buffs and enthusiasts who've been keeping Sausalito's past alive since 1975. The SHS is an entirely volunteer 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that collects and preserves art, artifacts, photographs and printed materials that document Sausalito's history. We provide access to the collection for public and academic research and develop publications and outreach programs to inspire local interest in Sausalito's history. As a result, we are able to educate the visiting public and to enrich the community. Annual membership dues, donations, and funds raised are used for new acquisitions, maintenance of the collection and public outreach through exhibits and publications.

EXHIBIT LOCATIONS

The Society staffs and manages the **Ice House Visitor Center and Museum** featuring a permanent display of local history. There is also a gift area featuring works of art by local artists and a selection of gift items relating to Sausalito and its history. The Ice House is open from 11:30am-4pm on Tuesday through Sunday, and is located at 780 Bridgeway (across from Casa Madrona). **415-332-0505**

The Historical Society's **Exhibit Room** and the **Phil Frank History and Research Room** are located on the top floor of City Hall. A team of dedicated Docents are available to assist and guide you. You will encounter a changing exhibit of historical significance plus an opportunity to do research through our Archives. Sausalito Historical Society Teaches Local History to Third Graders

The Sausalito Historical Society is bringing history to life for third grade students in the Sausalito and Marin City School District.

The children look forward to the interactive history lessons, which include classroom visits from costumed docents who tell their "personal" stories about early years in Sausalito.

The students learn how to research local history at the Sausalito Historical Society, where they view old maps, documents, artwork and artifacts. Each class also visits the City Council Chambers where they role-play as the City Council, city staff and concerned citizens. This past winter, the young citizens requested, among other things, that the City Council authorize riding of hover boards on city sidewalks and eliminating the requirement for youths to wear bicycle helmets. The "council-members-for-a-day" wisely advised their "constituents" that their utmost concern is for safety and they could not support those requests. Smart kids!

The Historical Society also leads school field trips to the Ice House Museum, the downtown historic district and the Marinship. The students test their skills as history detectives by identifying old buildings and searching for artifacts.

This fun curriculum is important not only for the students' education, but also in preparing them to be conscientious citizens who will protect Sausalito's vibrant history for generations to come.

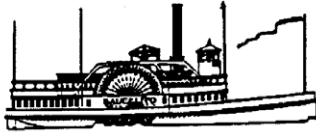

Bike Safety

As we enter the summer, we begin a familiar cycle in Sausalito. The streets and sidewalks become more and more crowded. Cars, tour buses, bicycles and pedestrians jockey for space and right of way. As the tourist season wears on, patience shortens and tempers flare.

As peacekeepers, officers of the Sausalito Police Department are usually right in the thick of the chaos. We respond to thefts, disputes, collisions, road rage and hit-and-runs all season long.

Below are some summer tips for anyone who drives, bikes and walks the streets of Sausalito:

Be predictable! Whenever possible, follow the rules of the road. Signal well ahead of time. Look twice. Make slow and steady lane changes and turns. Too often we make driving maneuvers in a hurried manner. Most collisions could be avoided if everyone followed this simple concept.

Bicycle lanes are traffic lanes! All rules, including right of way, apply. Want to make that right turn? Don't just check for bicycles next to you – look back. As you slow to turn, it is very possible for a bicycle to overtake you. Ideally, you will use your signal well ahead of time and the bicycle will pass on the left side of your vehicle.

Keep your eyes moving as you approach crosswalks! Continually check left and right. Some pedestrians assume that a car approaching a crosswalk will stop and they step into the crosswalk before checking to see if the car actually does. When a pedestrian is in the crosswalk, they own it! Do not pass in front of a pedestrian as they may speed up or suddenly run to get across the roadway quickly. Similarly, do not pass close behind

a pedestrian in the event they suddenly turn around because they forgot their credit card in the store they were just in. Remember, pedestrians are unpredictable creatures who frequently make quick decisions so give them plenty of time to enter the crosswalk and reach the other side of the street before you accelerate.

Share the road! Many places in Sausalito have 'Sharrows' (Share Arrows) painted on the ground. This is a depiction of a bicycle with chevrons indicating direction of travel. When you see this, it means the lane is not wide enough to comfortably bear vehicle and bicycle traffic side by side. Bicyclists may ride in the middle of the traffic lane at these locations. If you are a cyclist, the best times to do this are when you are keeping up with the speed of traffic or you feel unsafe. Many motorists do not understand what the Sharrows mean and will quickly become impatient and agitated being slowed to 10-15 mph. In the end, this can create an even more dangerous situation.

If at any time you are driving, riding, or walking and someone doesn't observe these basic concepts of courteous travel, just sigh and smile. No doubt, someone else felt that way about something you did on the roadway today. With so many people, there is no way to accommodate everyone 100% of the time. Just remember that you are in one of the most beautiful places in the world and enjoy the day.

What's NEW with CARSS (Call A Ride for Sausalito Seniors)?

This winter, the Washington Post published an article entitled "What the World's Best Cities Will Look Like In 2030" and guess what? Sausalito, CA was one of two cities in the United States that was highlighted as a city of the future based on CARSS! It was noted in the article that the way cities handle transportation will be very important in the decades ahead and the City of Sausalito is already headed in the right direction.

The latest CARSS news is that it has expanded to provide rides to most evening Library events. Do you dread driving at night? Don't want to think about fighting for a parking space in the City parking lot? Think CARSS! Check out the list of events on the CARSS website at www.carss4you.org or phone the Program Coordinator at **415-944-5474**.

On a regular basis, CARSS rides are available Monday through Friday between the hours of 10am and 2pm. You can reserve a ride up to one week ahead, or call during those hours and receive a 'Same Day Ride' directly from the Driver. Drivers are volunteers who live locally and drive their own vehicles. They have been thoroughly vetted and trained.

Eligible riders must be 60 and older (or younger with a disability) and

able to get in and out of an automobile on their own. FREE rides originate anywhere in Sausalito and the Floating Homes and go anywhere in Sausalito, the Floating Homes and Marin City.

Sign up for CARSS today. It is simple! Go to www.carss4you.org and download an application or phone the Program Coordinator at **415-944-5474** to receive one in the mail or via email. Complete the application, return it to CARSS and start calling for rides.

Check the CARSS web site for the additional evening rides each month. These include most Sausalito Library evening events but may also include other Citywide events.

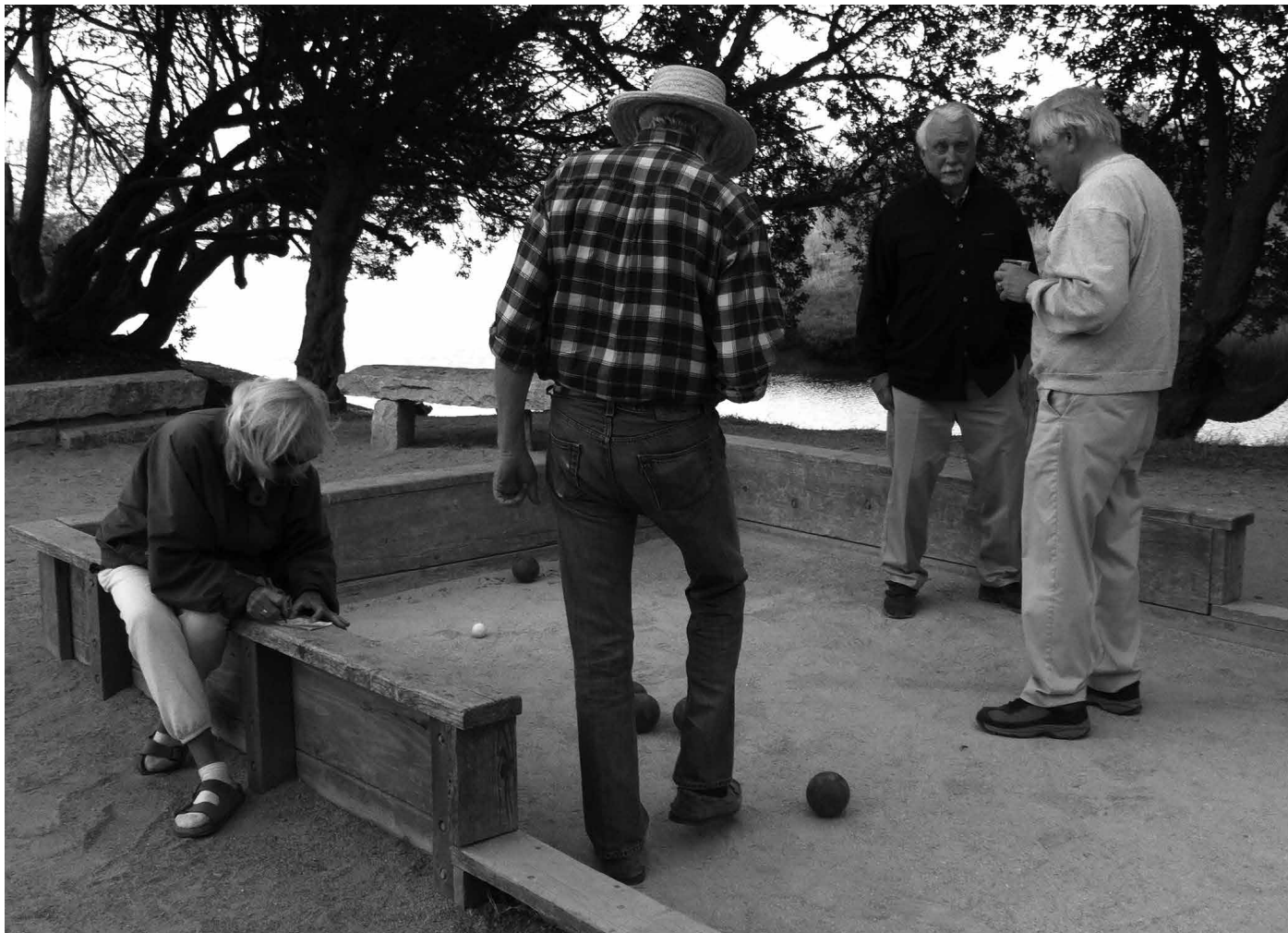

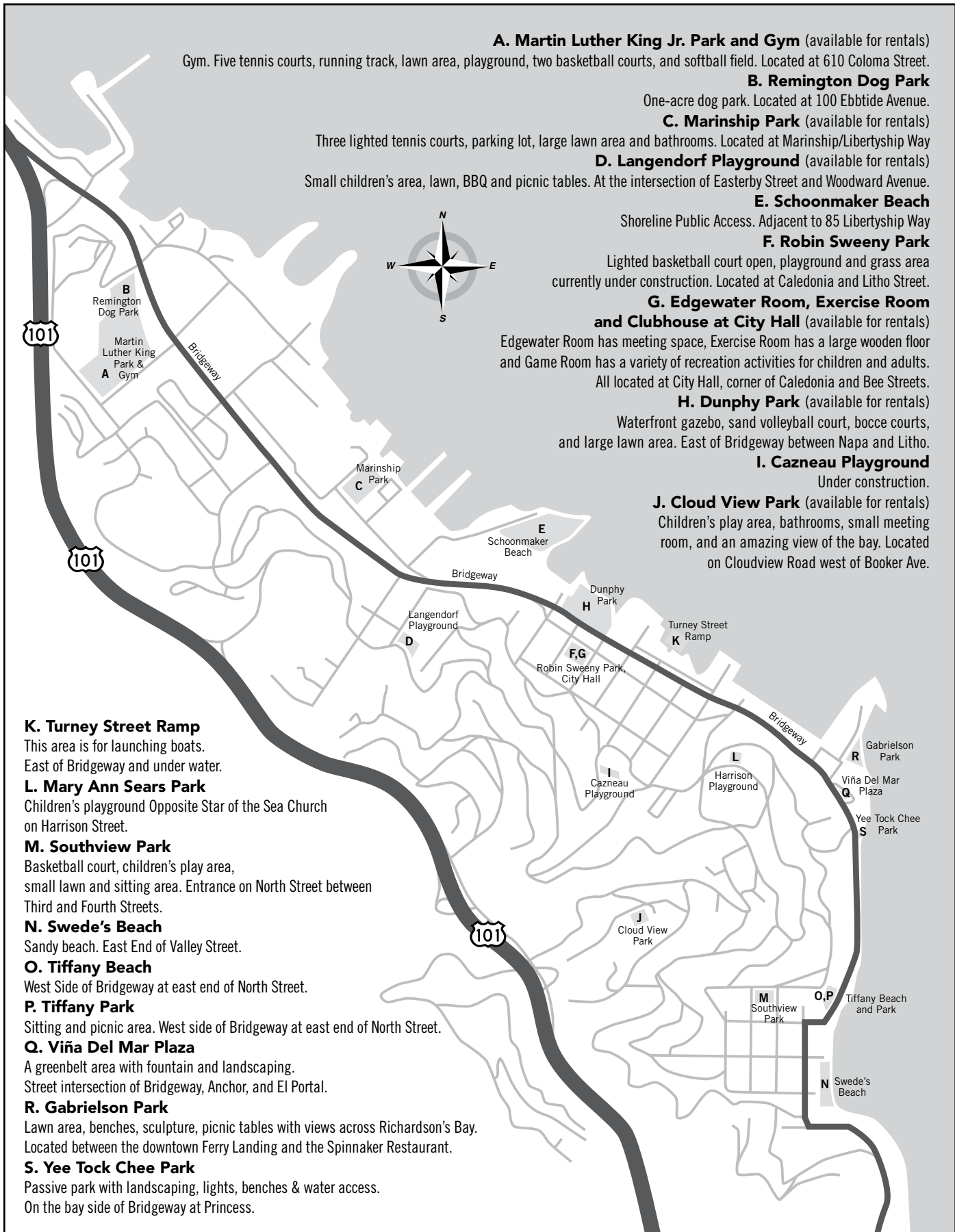

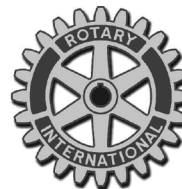
