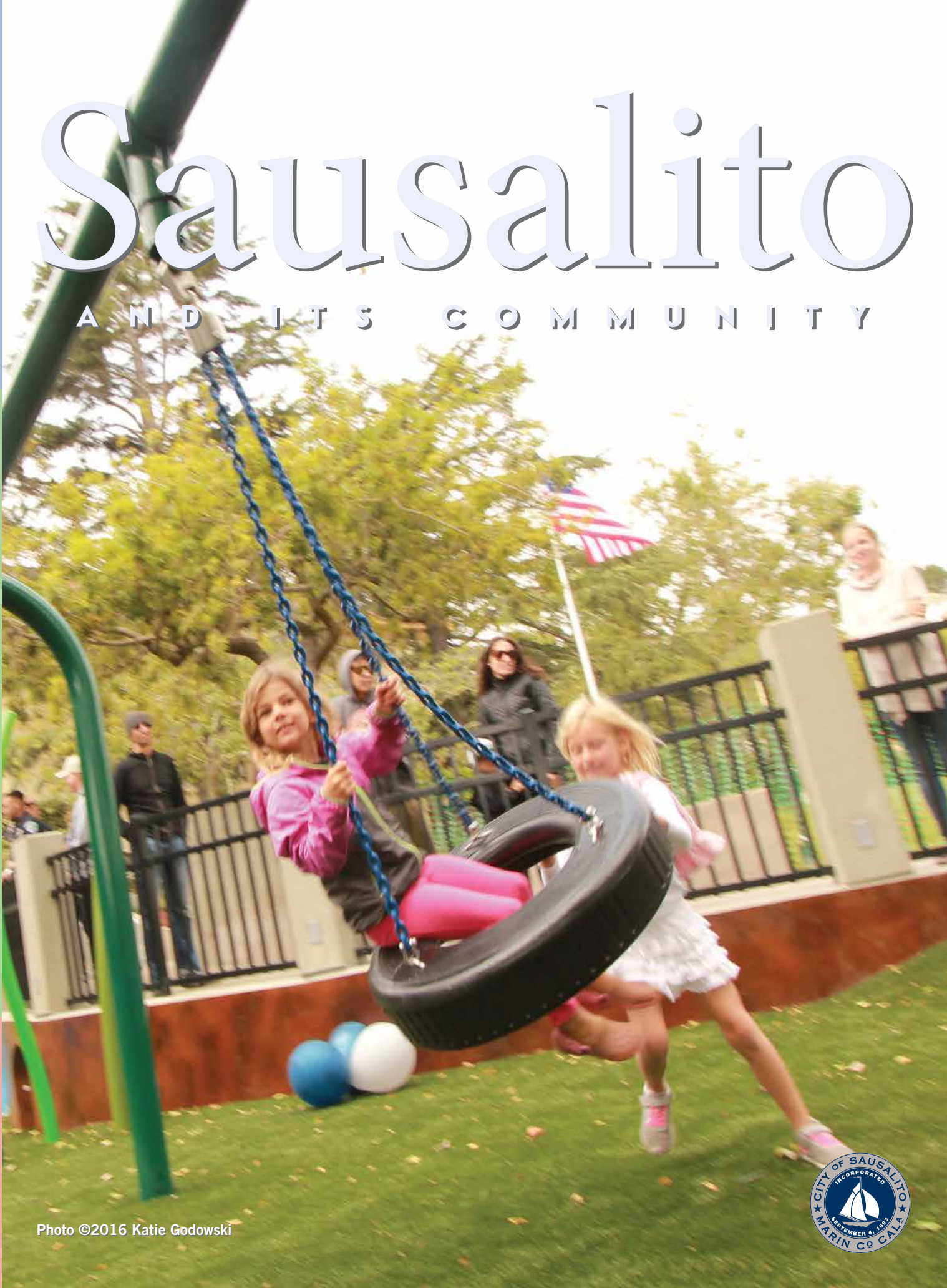

Willow Creek Academy is celebrating 15 years!

Willow Creek Academy, Sausalito/Marin City's Charter School, has grown tremendously in the last 15 years. We've become the most diverse school in Marin while educating over 400 students from Sausalito and Marin City. So much has contributed to the success of the school including countless volunteer hours, non-profit partnerships, and business sponsorships. We're so proud to stretch every dollar we receive (less than \$8000/student/year) and we're even more proud to represent this wonderful community we're in. We're excited to bring another fifteen years of quality education to Sausalito/Marin City.

If you were to visit our lunchroom, you would see over 50 different flags hanging from the ceiling. Each one representing the country that one or more of our students are from. We are constantly adding new flags to show our diverse culture. Last year, there were over 35 unique languages spoken at home by the families of our students. And about half of our students are from low-income families, receiving free or reduced lunch. It's a beautiful and amazing collective of diversity that is incredibly rare to occur in any one school.

Last year, we partnered with Bayside/MLK's Conscious Kitchen to bring a healthy lunch program to the students, administration and teachers. Studies show that children who have a healthy snack and lunch are more likely to succeed in school. The Conscious Kitchen lunch program is focused on FLOSN: Fresh, Local, Organic, Sustainable, Non-GMO. And we've helped to make history...Sausalito/Marin City School District is the first in the nation to provide a FLOSN meal for a district of students. The students have been thrilled with the new lunch program, creating a demand for cooking classes, and a robust garden/nutrition program. It makes sense for Willow Creek to support garden/nutrition since we have four gardens on campus. The difficulty is maintaining those gardens without a budget. Thankfully, a group of teachers, parents and grandparents lead the charge to keep them thriving. And a few businesses (Cibo, Drivers Market, Bank of Marin, Heath Ceramics) and non-profits (The Sage Garden Project) have donated to

keep them funded. Sometimes a vegetable garden is a great place to write creatively or practice math!

10th annual Gingerbread House Tour: A Sausalito Tradition

Nothing conjures up warm feelings of Holiday cheer better than a gingerbread house, trimmed with white frosting snow, candy cane fences, and gum drop roof shingles. The Sausalito Gingerbread House Tour, now in its 10th year, has become a tradition for locals and visitors from all over the Bay Area. Local merchants display these magical creations during the whole month of December.

But gingerbread “house” may not be quite the right term. Creativity abounds in these confectionary delights. We have seen lighthouses, an underwater seascape with musical sea creatures, a full mockup of Alcatraz Island, boats, ships and some amazing depictions of Sausalito landmarks. No rules apply . . . other than, the majority of the display be “edible”.

Sponsored by the Chamber of Commerce, the Gingerbread House Tour can be a fun family outing, a diversion from holiday shopping, or an excuse to get the girls together for lunch in one of Sausalito’s fantastic restaurants. A new feature this year is the ability for merchants to “Adopt-a-Baker”. It’s

an opportunity for anyone in Sausalito’s creative community to showcase their baking skills. If you are one of those people, contact the Chamber of Commerce and we can pair you with a merchant who can give you a place to show off your work.

Gingerbread houses will be on display throughout Sausalito, with concentrations along Bridgeway, Princess and the Caledonia Street neighborhood. Maps highlighting each participating merchant will be available in mid November and throughout December at the Chamber office, at the ferry landing, at participating merchants or by downloading at www.sausalito.org.

Measure F Project Update

On July 2 we celebrated the Grand Re-Opening of Robin Sweeney Park with a few speeches, a flag raising ceremony, cookies and lemonade, and of course lots of laughter. Robin Sweeney Park was the first project completed with funds from Measure F which was passed by voters in the November 2015 election. The project was completed on time, within budget, and most importantly, getting accolades by both parents and children alike.

City Staff has now turned their attention to the other three projects to be funded by the Measure F funds. We are currently reviewing bids from landscape architecture companies to draw up the construction documents for Dunphy Park based on the plans designed by the Friends of Dunphy Park and accepted by the City Council. We expect construction to begin next summer or fall. AMB Building Solutions has been hired by the City to complete the repairs listed in the MLK Facility Condition Assessment completed in 2015. AMB is currently working on full plans with the first priority to be replacing the leaky roofs. The entire project is expected to take two years to complete. Staff is also working on Southview Park to fully determine what work needs to be done and the most efficient way to renovate the Park. In addition to the beautification of the park, the main task will be to shore up the retaining walls that hold the park up. We have to have a good foundation to start from!

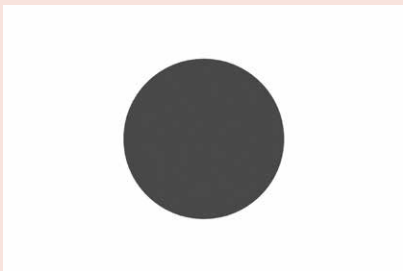

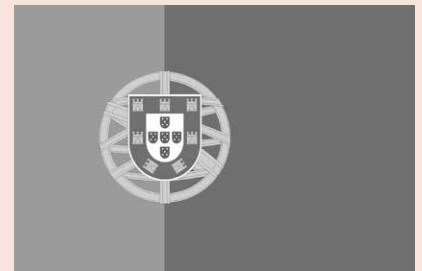

The Sausalito Historical Society (SHS)

We are a group of friends, neighbors, colleagues, local merchants, scholars, writers, artists, historians, history buffs and enthusiasts who've been keeping Sausalito's past alive since 1975. The SHS is an entirely volunteer 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that collects and preserves art, artifacts, photographs and printed materials that document Sausalito's history. We provide access to the collection for public and academic research and develop publications and outreach programs to inspire local interest in Sausalito's history. As a result, we are able to educate the visiting public and to enrich the community. Annual membership dues, donations, and funds raised are used for new acquisitions, maintenance of the collection and public outreach through exhibits and publications.

EXHIBIT LOCATIONS

The Society staffs and manages the Ice House Visitor Center and Museum featuring a permanent display of local history. 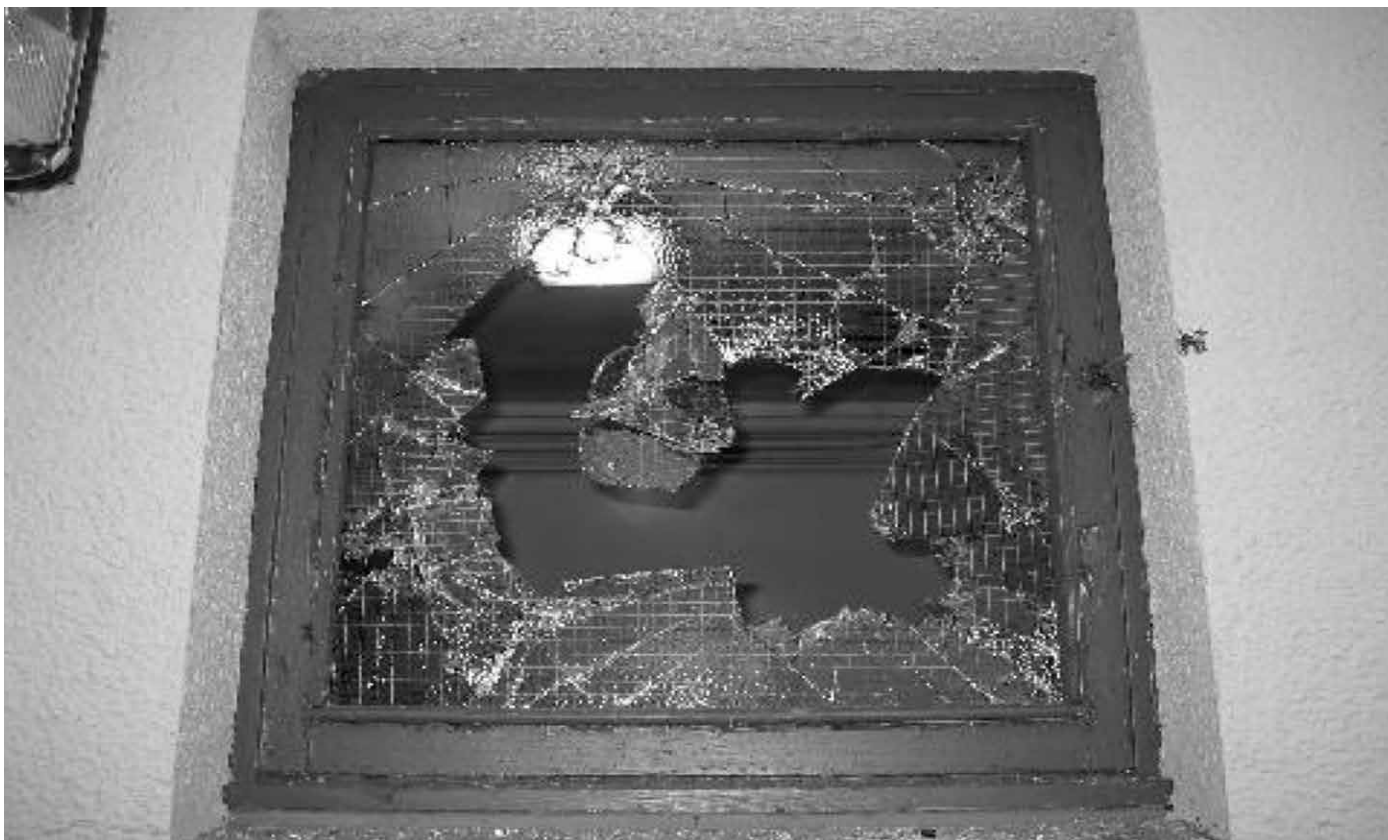
HOW YOUR DONATIONS SUPPORT THE LIBRARY

Crime Prevention and Safety Tips: Vandalism

Vandalism is a crime usually perpetrated by a faceless, unidentified individual against an unsuspecting person. It could be committed randomly as a juvenile prank, or directed specifically toward a person such as a former spouse or a business. Businesses may lose profits and employee time.

Vandals often target vehicles, but vandalism may be directed toward other personal property such as a residence, fixtures, or clothing. Various practical jokes may consist of vandalism. There are publications written solely on the topic with disclaimers stating it is for “entertainment purposes” and the printing is covered by the first amendment.

Materials used to commit the crime of vandalism can include sharp objects, paint, bricks, marking pens, or pellets. Not everyone reports vandalism where property is destroyed. Citizens often feel the perpetrators won't be apprehended and that their insurance deductible is too high for the damages. Thus, the actual damage may be three or four times greater than reported.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

1. Report all vandalism. Police may arrest someone a few days later as another crime occurs. You may be eventually compensated through court ordered restitution.
2. Keep lights on around your home. Criminals don't like lights and don't like being observed.
3. Park your car close to your house in the driveway, or in front of a home. In apartment complexes, try to park under light near a well-traveled location.

4. Don't leave partially used spray cans of paint on top of the trashcan in plain view. It may give vandals ideas.
5. Find out why your dog is barking. He may be warning you of someone outside doing something.
6. Be active in your community. Report what you see. You'd want someone to do the same for you.
7. Watch your children closely. Parents are financially responsible for the acts of their children. If a child is allowed to continue committing crimes unpunished, they may continue to commit crimes into adulthood.
8. If you learn of crimes or vandalism occurring in your neighborhood or were victimized yourself, become vigilant. Place a video camera in your window (well concealed) and turn it on during the day or night for a while. If nothing occurs, just rewind it. If something does occur, you may have caught a criminal in the act.
9. Certain exterior paints on the market that foil graffiti and can be cleaned off easily. You may wish to contact a paint dealer for further information. However, notify the Sausalito Police Department before cleaning any graffiti. We want to see it first.

These tips and suggestions don't guarantee you won't be victimized, but they may help better your odds.

What's NEW in Sausalito Village? We're Getting EDGY!

Cutting edge, that is. Besides all our other varied, informative, and entertaining activities, we have recently launched a series of talks and workshops we're calling "Being Mortal", based on the best-selling book of the same name by *New Yorker* writer and Boston surgeon Dr. Atul Gawande.

Our forward leaning membership, via questionnaires and conversations at our gatherings, has enthusiastically requested programming dealing with end of life issues. So we're on it! And it turns out to be a hot topic, and not just among the older folks either! To get back to the "edginess" of all this, we have tapped into a growing subculture of people of all ages, from all over the world, who are looking at the end of life in whole new ways, both practically and philosophically.

Our series launched last October with a screening of the PBS Frontline documentary about Dr. Gawande, *Being Mortal: Medicine and What Matters in the End?* This is a riveting film exploring how the medical profession currently deals with people at the end of their lives, and how much room there is for more enlightened practices in this area. The screening touched us all profoundly, fomented much discussion, and led us into further and deeper exploration.

Our first programs dealt with practical matters surrounding end of life planning. In March of this year, RN Randy Reitzes of Hospice by the Bay did a talk for us titled *What is Hospice? Facts and Myths*. In April we had a fascinating presentation on palliative care by Judith Redwing Keyssar, RN and Director of the Palliative Care Program at Seniors At Home (a division of Jewish Family Home Services of San Francisco) and one of the founders of the California State University Institute of Palliative Care. Palliative care, it turns out, is available to everyone, not just people in the final stages of life. There is a growing and dynamic movement underway—with a strong Bay Area component—to make palliative care better understood, more widely available, and more universally and institutionally supported. In late July, we conducted a workshop on the preparation of Advance Directives, the documents that give legal status to our end of life wishes.

Next, we plan to delve into the mysteries of mortality from more philosophical and metaphysical standpoints. We are learning that for those of us willing to confront end of life issues head on, there are boundless and rich rewards. And some of this is eye-popping! Google, for example, "Death Cafes". Check out the website theorderofthegooddeath.com. You will be amazed!

On a lighter note, we are also planning a series of informal Living Room Chats in private homes all around town to spread the word about Sausalito Village—and the infinite benefits of membership and/or volunteering. Age Friendly Sausalito ACTION PLAN Unveiled

The number of Sausalito residents aged 60 and older increased by 72% in the decade between the 2000 and 2010 censuses. Take a moment to let that set in . . . 72%.

Sausalito is one of the fastest aging cities in the County and Marin County is the fastest aging county in the State. According to the most recent Marin Grand Jury Report on aging released on June 18, 2014, one in four Marin County residents is aged 60 and older and by the year 2030, the number will increase to one in three.

In April 2013 it became important to a group of Sausalito citizens to address these growing statistics and plan for the future of our City to ensure that it will always be accessible and inclusive to its residents. The mission that was created and presented to the City Council was "to move Sausalito forward as an Age Friendly City so that its residents can actively age in place. A community that is better for older adults is a community that is better for everyone."

Within months, the citizen group was appointed by a unanimous vote of the City Council as the newly formed Age Friendly Sausalito Task Force and their work began to unfold. Eight months later Sausalito joined the World Health Organization (WHO) Global Network of Age Friendly Cities and Communities, a baseline assessment was completed with a Community Survey of all residents 55 and older and this committed AFS Task Force began developing programs that are now part of the fabric of our community including CARSS (Call A Ride for Sausalito Seniors).

This fall, the AFS Task Force will unveil their three-year Action Plan which describes the who, why, where, when and what will be of Age Friendly Sausalito. This Action Plan will be presented to the Sausalito City Council, Marin County Board of Supervisors and the World Health Organization and will be available to all residents interested in learning more. 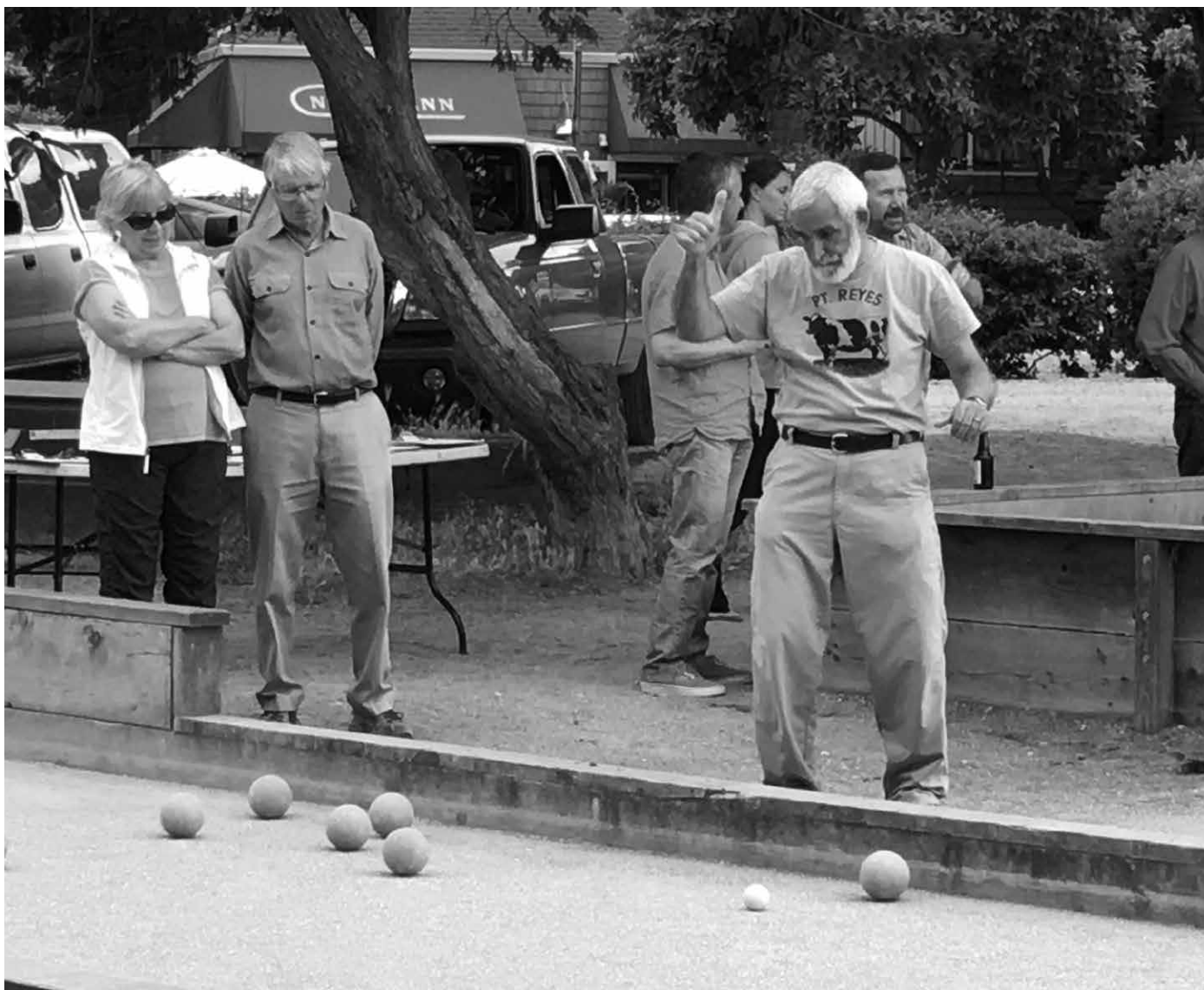

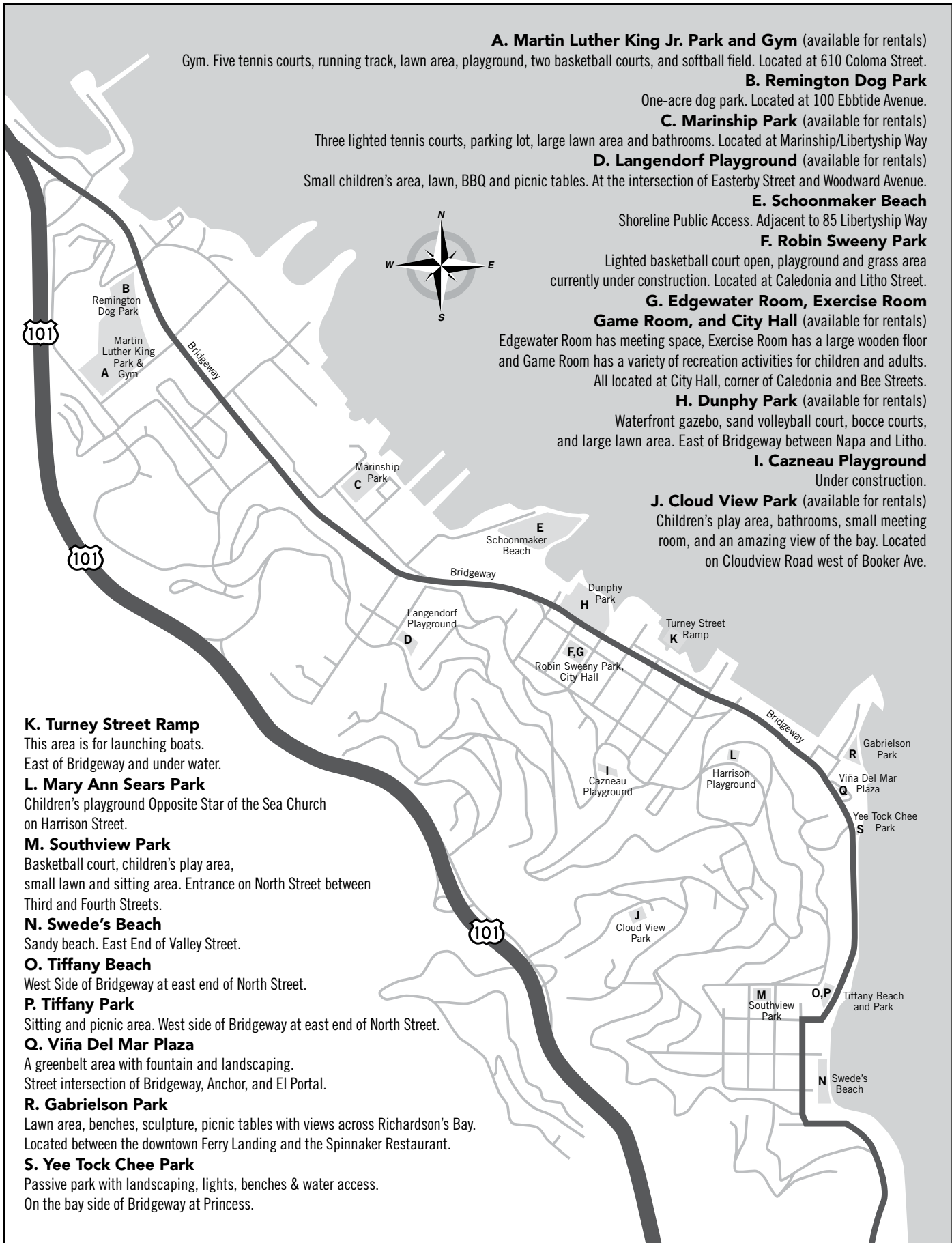

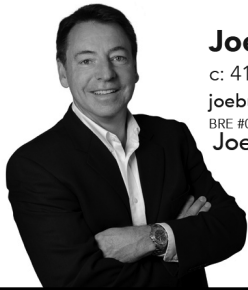
