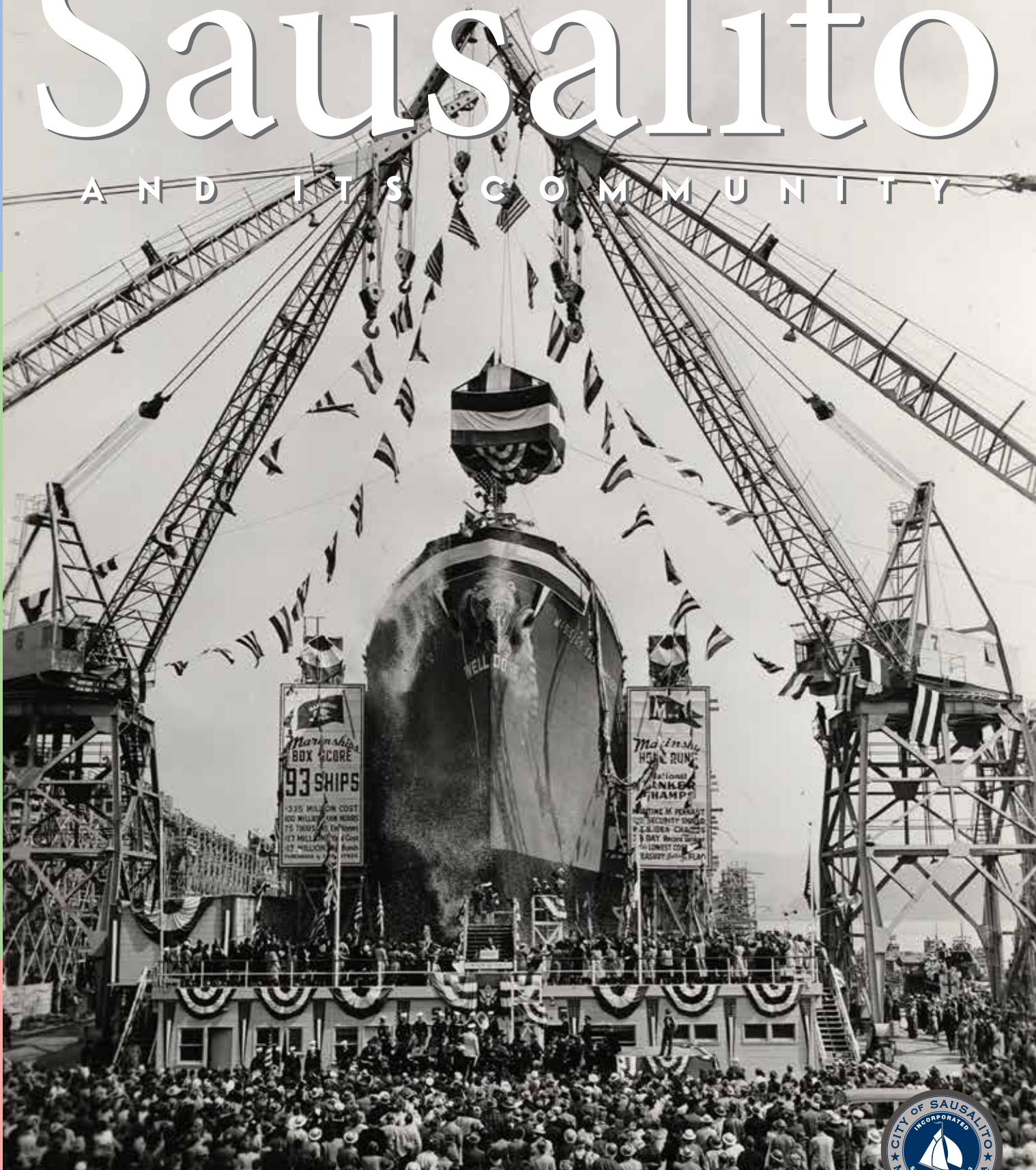

Free Lawn Area and Chair Rules and Regulations

Each year the free Jazz & Blues by the Bay concert series becomes more and more popular attracting greater crowds. In order to ensure that it is a positive experience for all, the following rules and regulations have been adopted for the free lawn seating area:

- Chair seats may be no taller than 8" from the ground
- Chair backs may be no taller than the shoulder height of the occupant (no exceptions)
- Tables may be no taller than 18"
- Rocks used to hold blankets in place must be returned
- Please use only the space you need
- Areas between reserved tables are off limits for blankets. Any blankets placed in these areas will be removed
- Please make space for others. Let's all have a good time!
- Please do not park on Spinnaker Way in the red zone, or you will be cited and towed.

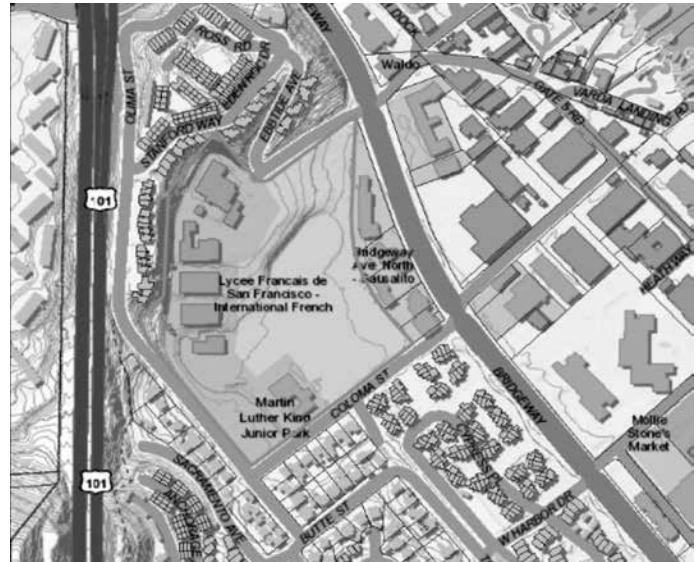

Dunphy and Southview Parks Renovation

On May 5th the Planning Commission approved the new plans for the renovation of Dunphy Park. Staff is now busy working with our Landscape Architect and other consultants to get ready for construction this summer. If all goes well, construction will start in July and continue on into the fall. The plans call for reconfiguration of the parking lot with proper ADA parking spaces, drainage, and landscaping. The park area will include a much needed additional Bocce Court, restrooms, and a new sand volleyball court. The middle of the park will look much the same with the addition of trees, paved walking paths, and picnic tables. A big part of the project includes shoreline restoration and improving the habitat at the end of Litho Street.

In addition to Dunphy Park, we are working on renovating Southview Park this summer. The park will end up looking much the same but with new play equipment and a redesigned upper terrace that takes advantage of the fantastic views to be had.

Funds for the renovation of these parks as well as Robin Sweeny Park (completed last summer) and repairs to the MLK campus were made possible by Measure F which voters approved in November 2015.

Renovating the Martin Luther King, Jr. Campus

Have you visited the Martin Luther King Jr. (MLK) campus recently? You may have noticed some construction buzz happening! That's because late last year, the City kicked-off a multi-year modernization project. MLK is a City-owned property that's over 70 years old. The intent of the project is to implement necessary repairs, alterations, and improvements that were identified in a 2015 Comprehensive Facility Condition Assessment (CFCA). Why is this important? The City is committed to make MLK a long-term sustainable flagship property for the City.

An Aging Infrastructure. The property was originally developed by the Military to support the ship building efforts during World War II. When the war ended, the Sausalito School District moved in and the property served as a school campus until the 1980s. Today, the City of Sausalito leases the existing buildings to various tenants including artists, small cottage industries, and two private schools. Much of the original infrastructure from the 1980s remain. Therefore, the MLK property is in dire need of modernization to reduce energy consumption and deliver upgrades to its major public amenities such as the sport courts, fields, and parking lot.

Please Pardon Our Dust! The first phase of work is focused on the roof. The existing tar and gravel roof is currently being replaced with a grey colored, GAF EverGuard Thermoplastic Polyolefin (TPO) roof (sample available for viewing at the Community Development Department). New edge metal and gutters will also be installed. By the end of summer 2017, all 11 buildings will have a new roof. Also on the roof, new HVAC units and gas lines have been installed. The next phase of work will include interior improvements such as: lighting and electrical upgrades, water conservation and plumbing upgrades, and mechanical updates. Expect to see renovated bathrooms and new lighting inside of the gymnasium! These upgrades will help Sausalito reduce energy consumption. 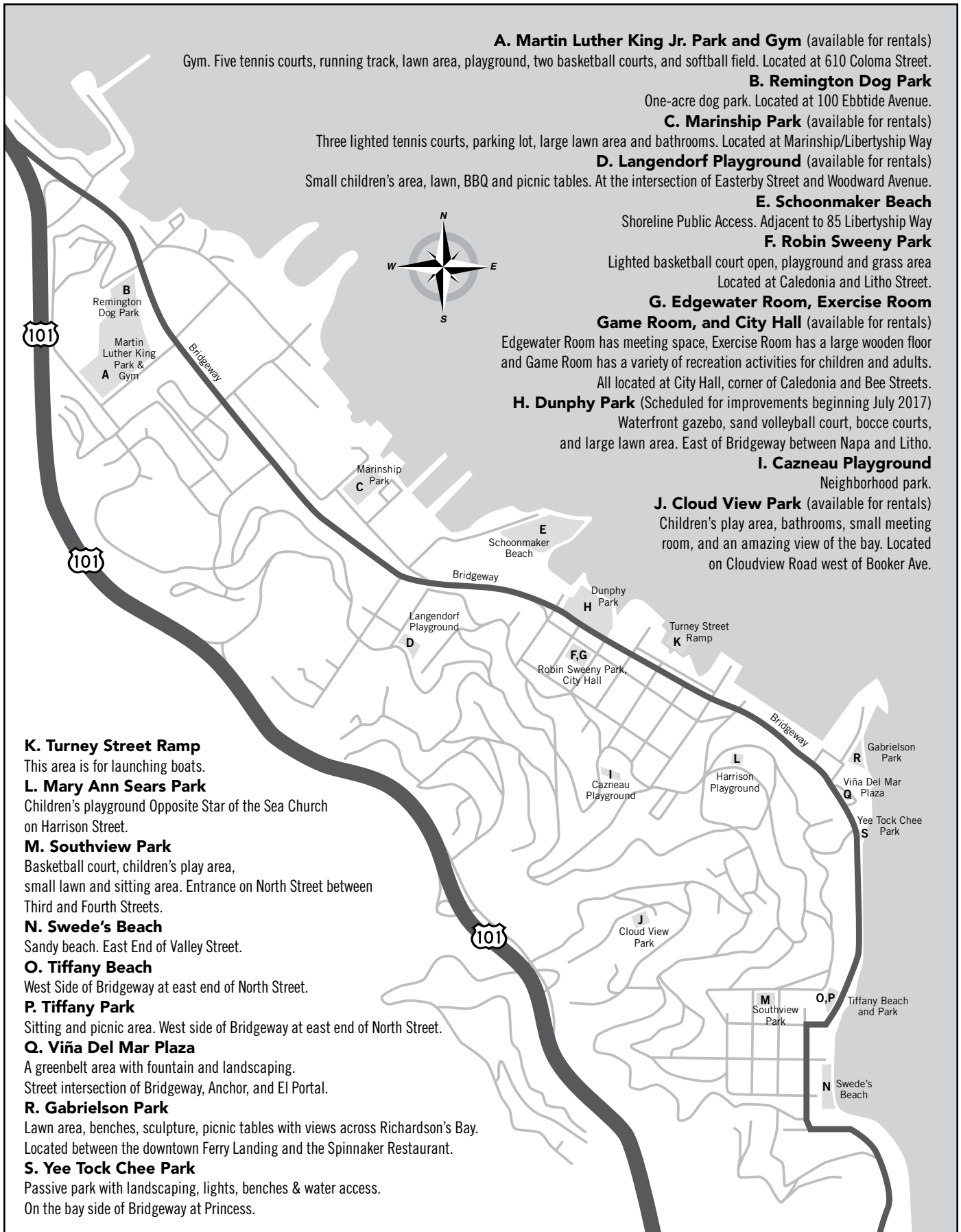

These were simple tasks that pose great risk to older residents who might try to do it themselves.

Sausalito Village provides assistance year round for simple tasks such as changing high lightbulbs or moving items too heavy for the member but the Annual Rotary/Village Chore Day is open to all seniors in town. Volunteers had such a good time they are already planning for next year!

This happened because the Sausalito City Council unanimously agreed to create a City Task Force and to allow the group to put in an application along with a letter of commitment from the Mayor to create a strategic plan for our City which was unanimously agreed upon in late 2016. Fairfax and Corte Madera also became members of the WHO Network.

Age Friendly Marin support group meets each month prior to the monthly Marin Commission on Aging meetings. Cities that have already received designation meet with city representatives who are at some stage in the process to support one another in their efforts and to share best practices along the way.

Age Friendly Sausalito is a great example of the power of the Age Friendly movement in the County having created CARSS (Call A Ride for Sausalito Seniors). Age Friendly Sausalito has also partnered with many groups to create presentations related to affordable alternatives in housing, transportation, home modifications, and more.

The County of Marin's Department of Aging and Adult Services is very involved in the Age Friendly Movement and is working hard to address the realities of the County's Longevity Boom. The department recently released the following important announcement:

"Older adults are the fastest growing age group in Marin County. Today one in four Marin residents is over age 60, and that number is estimated to rise to one in three by 2030. On average, Marin residents enjoy a life expectancy that ranks among the top five of all counties in the United States."

The County of Marin recognizes the growing needs of seniors and assigns it a high priority. With a growing older adult population living longer lives, more questions are being asked about appropriate community-based resources. Marin County Aging and Adult Services, a division of the Department of Health and Human Services (HHS), is poised to provide answers.

Over the past year, the department's Information and Assistance program has undergone major enhancements to meet the needs of older adults, family members and care partners in Marin. By reorganizing existing personnel and processes, there are now more HHS professional resource staff members available to speak directly to those calling **415-457-INFO** during business hours. Callers can receive information about a full range of local public, nonprofit and private social services and related resources. The professional resource workers can help a caller explore options and identify individual needs and circumstances." Information can also be found online at livelonglivewellmarin.org.

The Sausalito Historical Society (SHS)

The SHS is an entirely volunteer 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that collects and preserves art, artifacts, photographs and printed materials that document Sausalito's history. We provide access to the collection for public and academic research and develop publications and outreach programs to inspire local interest in Sausalito's history. As a result, we are able to educate the visiting public and to enrich the community.

The Society staffs and manages the Ice House Visitor Center and Museum featuring a permanent display of local history. There is also a gift area featuring works of art by local artists and a selection of gift items relating to Sausalito and its history. The Ice House is open from 11:30am-4pm on Tuesday through Sunday, and is located at 780 Bridgeway (across from Casa Madrona). **415-332-0505**

Marinship 75 Exhibits

Step back to a dramatic time in Sausalito history by touring the Historic World War II Marinship Exhibit at the Bay Model. This display of photographs, paintings and actual artifacts from the WWII ships and yard was developed by the staff of the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the SHS. The Marinship Exhibit is open from 9am-4pm on Tuesday through Saturday and is located in the Bay Model Visitors Center at 2100 Bridgeway. **415-332-3871**

The Historical Society's Exhibit Room and the Phil Frank History and Research Room are located on the top floor of City Hall. SHS EXHIBIT ROOM - CELEBRATING MARINSHIP

Part 1 (Presently on display) Marinship - What it Was

This is a collection of 124 images with captions or story boards which shows and explains basic descriptions of various parts and features of the shipyard. Included is a brief historical narrative telling critical aspects of the shipyard operation. The displays on the North wall and Panoramic images will remain for the two following Marinship themed exhibits.

Part 2 (Opens Friday, July 7) The Ships of Marinship - What They Were, What They Did, and What Happened to Them

This will be a collection of 12 to 15 three foot long 1/16" per foot accurately scaled ship silhouettes which identify and explain the ships built at Marinship. Each silhouette will have a story board explaining details of the ships, what they were used for during the war, and what happened to them after the war. There are many interesting adaptations of the originally single purpose cargo ships, some of which affected Maritime commerce forever.

Part 3 (Opens Friday, September 8) The People of Marinship - Who They Were, Where They Came From, What They Did, and How They Did It

Story boards and captions will tell stories and the history of the people who worked at Marinship. A collection of iconic images from the SHS Archive will explain many of the shipyard's unique and interesting features.

City Hall Marinship75 Display Case

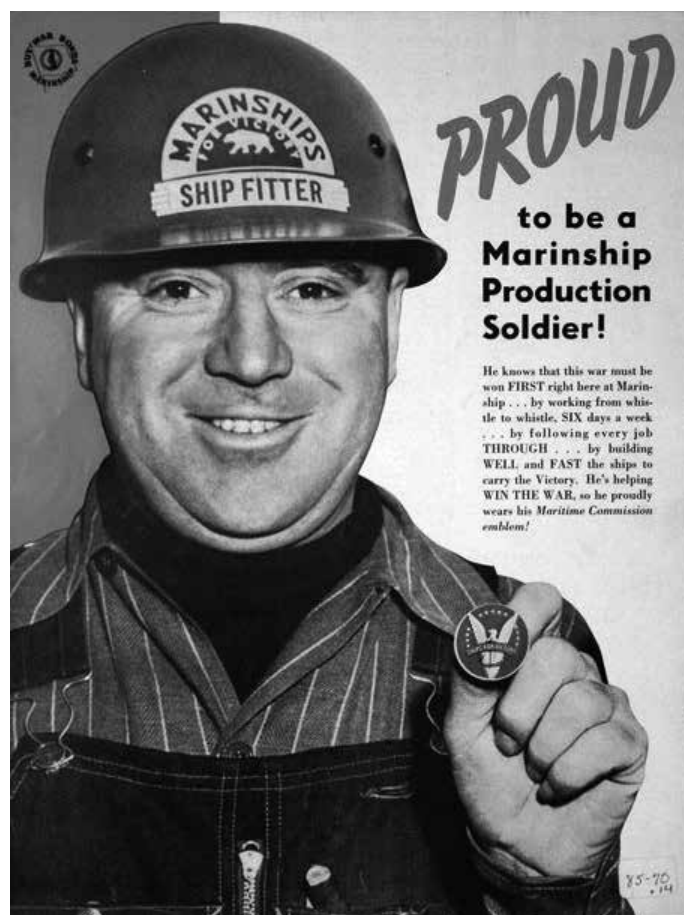
This collection is located on the Main Floor near the City Clerk and City Manager's office. It contains aerial photos of Marinship, a model of the Mission San Rafael, and various tools and artifacts.

10 Liberty Ship Way

This display is a panoramic image of the Marinship with large aerial images, on each side of the panorama. One will be an aerial image of the shipyard. The other image is a present day aerial image showing the shipyard site looking North with the buildings 10 and 30 Liberty Ship way shown prominently at bottom center. A third aerial image approximately 4 feet square is opposite the panorama.

30 Liberty Ship Way

This display is a series of ship silhouettes identifying the types of ships built at Marinship. A story board associated with each silhouette tells the details of the ship type portrayed, its use during WWII, and the general use of it after the war.



The RBMA has produced a commemorative Victory pin (similar to the pin given to the shipbuilders as displayed in the Victory poster), as a souvenir of our Marinship75 celebration.

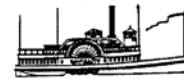

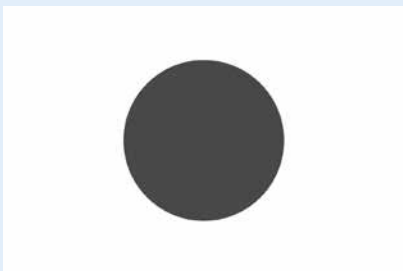

VIÑA DEL MAR, CHILE

Seven Women, Seven Dreams, Seven Days

In early April, seven women from Viña Del Mar came to Sausalito for seven days as part of our continuing mentoring and leadership workshop series. 2017 was the fifth installment of this series, and our theme this year was “The Path to Growth.”

All of the women are members of a business networking organization based in Viña Del Mar and Valparaiso, Chile. They are entrepreneurs, representing a variety of businesses, including graphic design, furniture design and production, clothing design and sales, home and interior design. They work out of their homes, out of retail spaces or from studios. As women-owned business, they face similar challenges as we do here, and they were all eager to learn from our experiences.

Co-chairs of the Viña Del Mar Operations Council are Monica Finnegan and Karen Aiken. The two of them are largely responsible for putting the actual learning program together. Other awesome and amazing council members, who continually rose above and beyond the call, include: Lynn Spiller, Cathy Stierhoff, Katya Wittenstein, Lynn Churchill, Lizzie Jeremi and Brenda DeBruyn.

The Chilean women stayed with host families in Sausalito for a week of intense learning through workshops, and lectures. They toured women-owned businesses, cooperative businesses and some dedicated to organic and sustainable products. They were able to strategize with successful local entrepreneurs to find new ways to help their businesses grow and thrive back in Chile. Some of the local businesses who met with the group were Laurel Skin Care, Jill Giordano of GrDano, Katya Wittenstein of Katya Glass, Lorna Newlin of Sausalito Pottery, Christopher Holbrook of Studio 333, Rebecca Bruce of Rebecca Bruce Designs, Rowena Finegan of Pine Street Interiors.

The women each spoke a little English, but not enough to be able to

understand everything. So, as an added challenge, all of the discussions and lectures had to be translated back and forth between English and Spanish. We have been so very lucky to have Lizzie Jeremi, a native Chilean now living in San Francisco, continue to help us as a translator. And this year, locals Brenda DeBruyn and Patricia Gatti also translated for us.

As a special treat this year, the Chilean women took over the kitchen of the Edgewater Room in City Hall on a Saturday and prepared a lunch of tasty treats that are typically Chilean. They worked all morning to prepare empanadas, completos, sopaipillas and salsa, and many more dishes. And no Chilean dinner would be complete without the national drink, pisco sours. In Chile, the afternoon meal is typically the largest, and this meal did not disappoint. The guests were more than satisfied and appreciative of the women’s hard work.

Also at the luncheon, the Chilean women displayed many of the products that they and some others in their organization had made. It gave all of us a chance to see the quality of their work and of course, to shop!

Local hosts this year were Monica Finnegan and Mike Kelly, Cathy Stierhoff and Frank Lawler, Brenda and Renee DeBruyn, Maria Paterno and Holger Mishal, Mardi Burnham Brayton and Rich Brayton, EV Gilbreath and Stanford Hughes, and Susan Roe and Tom Clark. Each of these families welcomed their guests into their homes and participated in travel logistics, various events and dinners, all the while getting to know their guest and showing them life in their Sister City of Sausalito.

We said goodbye to the women on a Sunday morning at Viña Del Mar Park, with lots of photos, hugs and a few tears. We will stay in touch with these women and others in the networking group in Chile and continue to help them on their “Path to Growth.”

CASCAIS, PORTUGAL

How to Host a Neighborfest

3. Clarify your own role and motivation. Ask yourself, *What am I really trying to accomplish here, and why?* Imagine a totally successful event and ask yourself, *As my neighbors are leaving the party, how will they FEEL, what will they KNOW, and what will they BE ABLE TO DO as a result of having participated?* Here's a tip: you only have their attention for an hour or two at each Neighborfest, so keep your expectations realistic. Success will build upon success.

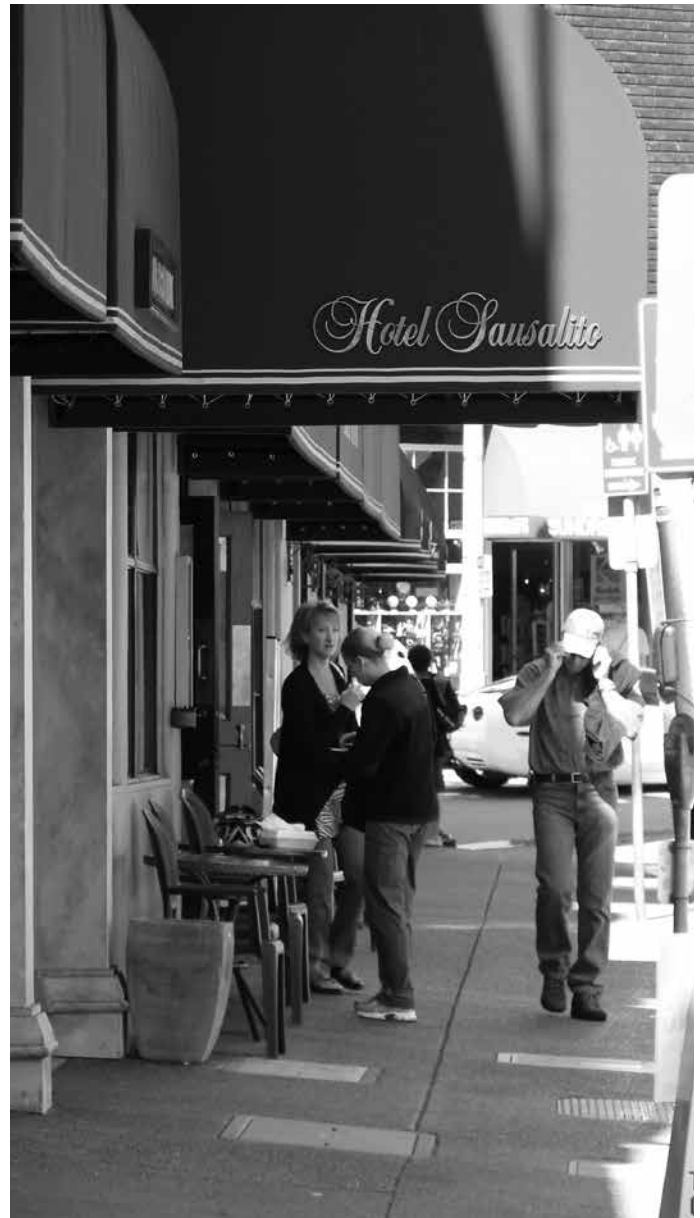
