How to research a property's history:

Below is an outline of items that should be researched along with local resources available to the public. Please be aware that the address or block/lot may have changed from the date of construction, so be sure to have all available addresses, block/lot before beginning research.

- Building Permit History. Start with a search for the full construction and permit history. The Department of Building Inspection (DBI) has copies of all building permits issued, often accompanied by architectural drawings. The original construction permit can tell when a property was built and what its original appearance was. Requests for permit history must be made in person at DBI, 1660 Mission Street, at the Customer Service Division. Please refer to http://www.sfdbi.org/ for more information.
- Water Department Records. Now a part of the Public Utilities Commission, the original SF Water Department's records can indicate when a building was constructed if the original building permits are not available. - San Francisco History Room. The Project site also includes Pier 31 1/2 on Parcel 9900031H immediately northwest of Parcel 9900031. The existing Pier 31½ substructure is a marginal wharf structure located between Piers 31 and 33. It comprises two distinct pier construction types: an old pier, built in the 1910s; and a newer pier, built in the 1960s. The old pier is located adjacent to The Embarcadero and is a contiguous part of the original Pier 33 construction. The adjacent newer pier is in better condition and is used by the current ferry concessioner for parking and assembly. Immediately southeast of the project site on Parcel 9900031 is Parcel 9900029H. This parcel includes the Pier 29 1/2 bulkhead building and shed between Pier 29 and Pier 31. Parcel 9900029H is zoned M-1 Light Industrial and is within the 40-X height/bulk district.

Across The Embarcadero from the subject parcel is Parcel 0036/001. This parcel is zoned C-2 Community
Business. This parcel includes a single story brick facade building in modern style. Northwest of Parcel 0036/001
is Parcel 0037/001, which is zoned C-2 Community Business and M-1 Light Industrial. Southeast of Parcel
0036/001 is Parcel 0057/001 which is also zoned C-2 Community Business and M-1 Light Industrial. These two
parcels include multi-story brick facade buildings in modern style.

The Project site also includes Pier 31 1/2 on Parcel 9900031H immediately northwest of Parcel 9900031. The existing Pier 31½ substructure is a marginal wharf structure located between Piers 31 and 33. It comprises two distinct pier construction types: an old pier, built in the 1910s; and a newer pier, built in the 1960s. The old pier is located adjacent to The Embarcadero and is a contiguous part of the original Pier 33 construction. The adjacent newer pier is in better condition and is used by the current ferry concessioner for parking and assembly. Immediately southeast of the project site on Parcel 9900031 is Parcel 9900029H. This parcel includes the Pier 29 1/2 bulkhead building and shed between Pier 29 and Pier 31. Parcel 9900029H is zoned M-1 Light Industrial and is within the 40-X height/bulk district.

Across The Embarcadero from the subject parcel is Parcel 0036/001. This parcel is zoned C-2 Community
Business. This parcel includes a single story brick facade building in modern style. Northwest of Parcel 0036/001
is Parcel 0037/001, which is zoned C-2 Community Business and M-1 Light Industrial. Southeast of Parcel
0036/001 is Parcel 0057/001 which is also zoned C-2 Community Business and M-1 Light Industrial. These two
parcels include multi-story brick facade buildings in modern style.
