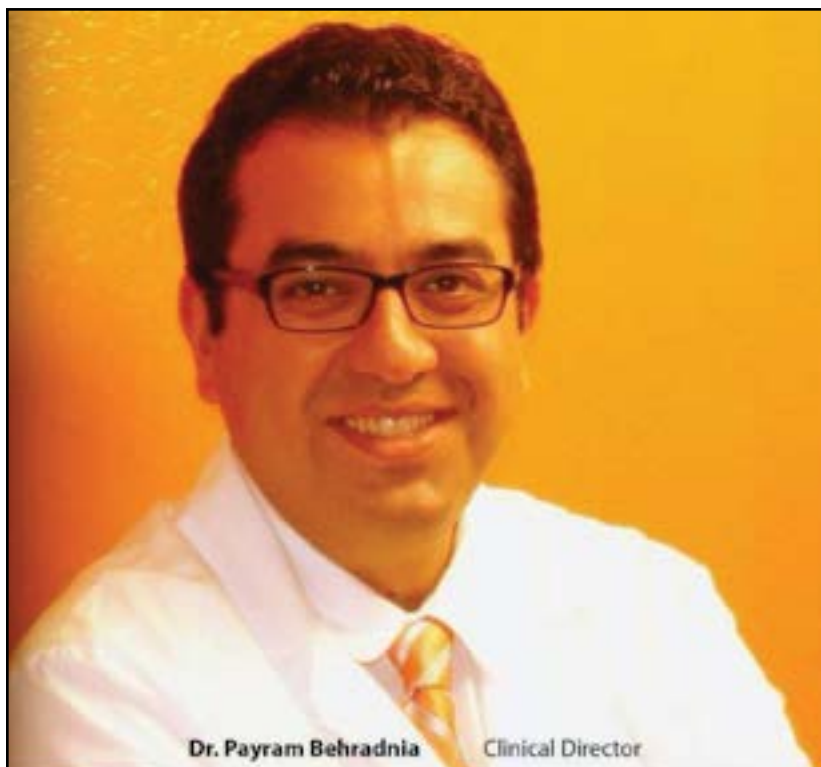

Parks and Recreation has been busy these past few months.

We are excited that the MLK Athletic Field construction and the Dunphy Park renovation projects are well underway.

Although two of our main outdoor spaces are unavailable, we have plenty of indoor spaces and classes to keep you active this winter. We are pleased to offer eight new Yoga classes, including a new Silver Sneakers Chair Yoga class. The Exercise Room is also available for self-guided yoga, stretching, or dance choreography for a nominal drop-in fee.

With spring and summer around the corner, so are our special events! Jazz and Blues by the Bay sponsor table sales have begun, and nightly tables go on sale March 4. Our Outdoor Movie Night on March 8 features *Top Gun*. TABLE TERMS & CONDITIONS

- Tables include a round table, six chairs, a linen tablecloth, and a table number
- Tables cannot be resold to other parties. They can be gifted.
- Tables will be selected from the 2019 Jazz Table Map. Check out www.jazzandbluesbythebay.com
- All table locations are approximate. There is no guarantee that tables will be placed at the exact same location each week.
- Tables must be cleared by 8:15pm each night for breakdown.
- Table holders must recycle/throw away all refuse from their table each night. Trash receptacles/recycling bins are placed throughout the park.
- Please do not park on Spinnaker Way in the red zone for any reason or you will be cited and towed.
- Items left on or around tables are not the responsibility of the City of Sausalito, its officers or agents.
- Tables and table name plates may not be moved.
- Up to two additional chairs are available per table per night for \$5 each for a maximum of eight chairs per table. Chairs may not be lent to other tables. Do not take chairs from other tables.
- "Standing tables" without chairs must be approved prior to reserving table.

FREE SEATING TERMS & CONDITIONS

Each year the free Jazz and Blues by the Bay concert series has become more popular attracting greater crowds. To ensure a positive experience for all we ask you to comply with the following:

- Chairs in free lawn seating area must not have seats taller than 8" from the ground and the backs of the chairs may be no taller than the shoulder height of the occupant.
- Tables may be no taller than 18".
- Blankets between nightly tables will be removed.
- Rocks used to hold blankets in place must be returned at the end of the event.

- Please reserve and use only the space you need.

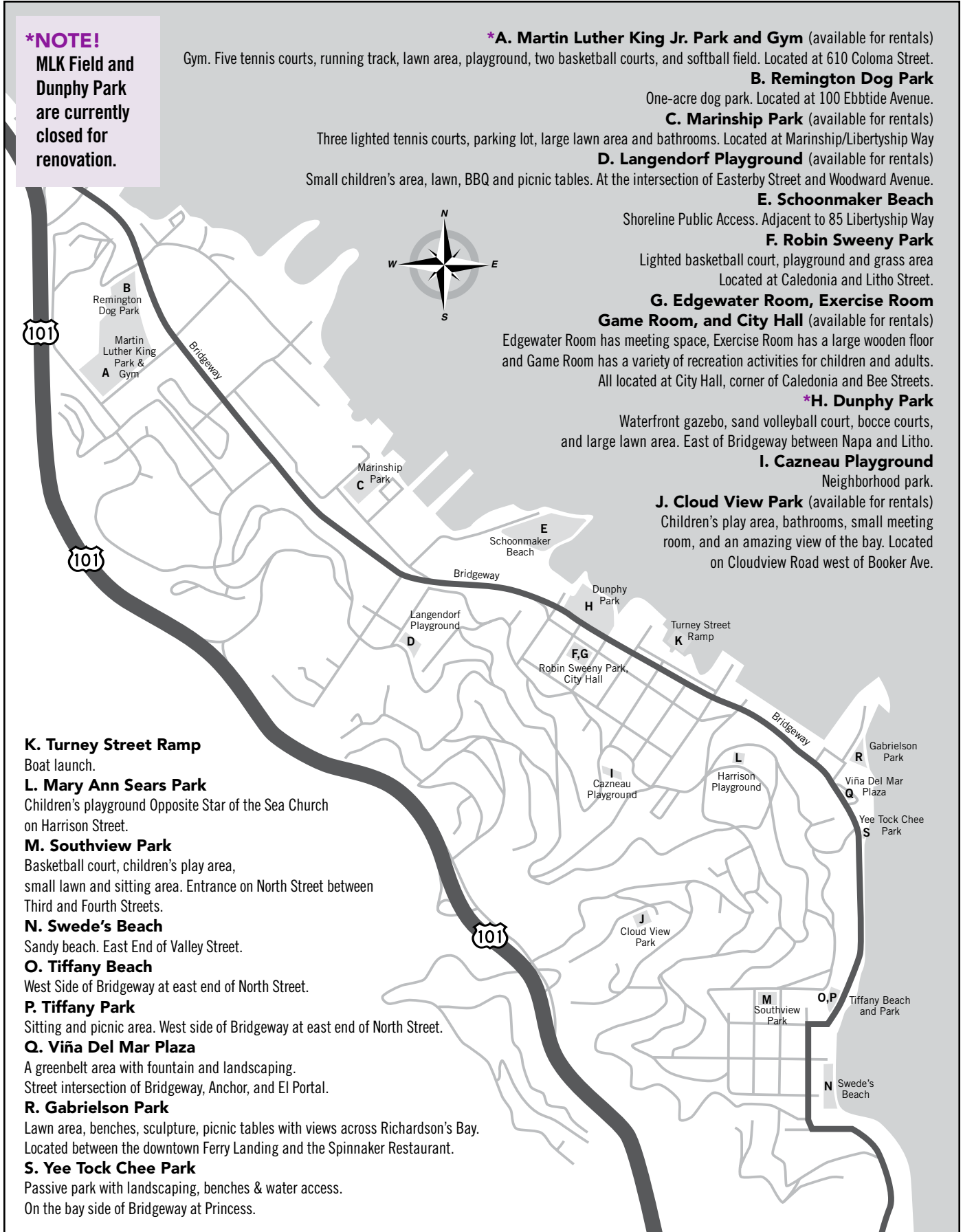

Streaming Movies and More with Kanopy and Hoopla

The Sausalito Library offers two free streaming video services to Sausalito residents. Kanopy (sausalito.kanopystreaming.com) features thousands of independent, classic, documentary, and foreign films, including Paramount classics and films from the Criterion Collection of world cinema. Think of it as a free version of Netflix. Hoopla (www.hoopladigital.com) features an eclectic selection of Hollywood and independent movies, as well as comics, e-books, music, and e-audiobooks. Both Kanopy and Hoopla can be accessed with your Sausalito library card via app, the Library website, or the web addresses above. E-Books and E-Audiobooks

The Sausalito Library offers a huge online collection of popular electronic books and e-audiobooks for adults and children through the OverDrive service. New York Times Online

Did you know that you can get free online access to the *New York Times* through the Library? By obtaining a special code from the Library website and creating an account with the New York Times using your email address, you can receive a 24-hour, unlimited-access pass. There is no limit to the number of times you can generate a 24-hour pass. The service will work for smartphones and tablets, as well as laptop and desktop computers. Unlimited Access to Lynda.com

Sausalito residents have access to the vast collection of online training courses and video tutorials available from Lynda.com – all you need is a library card. The courses and tutorials are taught by subject experts and cover everything from using your iPhone, to online marketing, to playing the electric guitar. Get a Library Card Without Visiting the Library

Online registration for a full-access library card is available for Marin County residents aged 16 years or older. When you apply online, you'll get immediate access to popular digital services like online tutorials from Lynda.com, movies from Kanopy, and e-books from OverDrive. A valid credit card with a Marin County billing address is required for address verification purposes only. Your credit card will not be charged. To obtain a library card, go to the Sausalito Library webpage and look for "Get a Library Card" under About Us.

Home Delivery Program

The Sausalito Library offers a home delivery service of library materials using volunteer drivers from Call a Ride for Sausalito Seniors (CARSS). Participation in this program is free and open to residents of Sausalito and the floating home community who are 60 years of age or older, and to younger adults with a disability. If you are interested in having books, movies, or audiobooks delivered to your door, you will need to fill out a short application and sign a liability waiver, in addition to being a library card holder. All CARSS drivers have been vetted by Verified Volunteers. The service is available Monday through Friday, 10am to 2pm. High-Speed Internet

The Sausalito Library's free public internet service went from slow to blazing fast in 2017, when the Library connected to CalREN, the California Research and Education Network. The change affects the public computers in the Library and the public Wi-Fi available in the Library and City Hall. At the Library's public internet stations, where download speeds had previously been in the range of 5 to 10 megabits per second (Mbps), users now see speeds topping out at 500 Mbps. The Library's free wireless network (called "library") has also gotten a big speed boost, to over 100 Mbps. Some mobile devices may see slower speeds due to hardware limitations.

Library Email Newsletters

There's a lot going on at the Sausalito Library! To help local residents stay on top of things, the Library has two email newsletters, one covering all Library programs and services, the other focused entirely on children's services. Visit the Library webpage to sign up for one or both newsletters, or send a "sign me up!" email message to Augie Webb at awebb@sausalito.gov. Library e-newsletters are sent out once every two weeks.

Ancestry

The popular genealogy software tool Ancestry is available for use on the

Library's public computers. Ancestry features censuses, vital records, immigration records, family histories, military records, court and legal documents, directories, photos, maps, and more. Museum Passes

Discover & Go is an online service you can use to reserve and print free and discount passes to Bay Area museums and cultural institutions like the Asian Art Museum, the Exploratorium, and the California Academy of Sciences. Look for the "Discover & Go" button in the Digital Collections area of the Library homepage to access the service. Please note that tickets for popular museums may not be available unless booked well in advance. Free Admission Tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor

In addition to the Discover & Go online service, the Library offers free general admission tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. Every adult library card holder living in Sausalito is entitled to one ticket per year (each ticket admits two adults). Tickets are purchased through grants from the Friends of the Library and the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation.

Borrow a California State Parks Vehicle Day Pass

Thanks to a generous gift of the family and friends of Lisa Kimberly Nunn York, the Library has two "Golden Poppy" California State Parks vehicle day passes available to the public. The passes provide free vehicle admission and parking at over one hundred state parks, beaches, and recreation areas, including area parks like Mount Tamalpais, China Camp, and Samuel P. Taylor. To borrow a pass, look for one of the Golden Poppy cases in the central display area of the Sausalito Public Library. Bring the case to the service desk with your library card, and you can check out a storage bag containing the pass and information about California State Parks. Passes circulate for seven days and are not renewable. To ensure that a pass is available and save yourself a trip to the Library, call the Reference Desk at **415-289-4121** — if a pass is available, we can set it aside for you for up to two hours.

Sausalito News Archive

Thanks to grants from the Sausalito Library Foundation and the Sausalito Historical Society, the Library is able to offer online access to digital archives of *The Sausalito News* from 1885 to 1966. The archive may be searched and browsed via the California Digital Newspaper Collection, maintained by the University of California, Riverside. Sausalito Marin Scope Digital Archive

Sausalito Sustainability Commission

As a 25-year Marin County resident, I feel very fortunate. We live in an extraordinary area. In the past, our county has demonstrated its ongoing dedication to protecting the land that makes Marin unique—Mt Tam, Pt. Reyes, and the Golden Gate recreation area—which, if not for the insistence of local residents would have been fully developed. This spirit has not only enhanced our day-to-day living, it also exemplifies Marin's commitment to helping maintain a healthy planet.

We are at a critical juncture again. And this time the need is so much greater. The Sausalito Sustainability Commission is actively pursuing solutions to address climate change for the benefit of all Sausalito residents and businesses. Here's the good news: these changes are achievable, are economically beneficial, and help advance new technologies that make society simply better.

At the state level, California is pursuing substantial CO2 reduction targets across key areas. At the county level, Marin has initiated the Drawdown: Marin program to help residents and businesses reduce emissions countywide. And at the city level, your Sustainability Commission is engaging at the local, county, and state levels to help advance these initiatives. This includes addressing sea-level rise.

Our goals are achievable, but it will take all of us. The pie chart at right shows Sausalito's carbon emissions profile. This is what we need to solve now, and with your help.

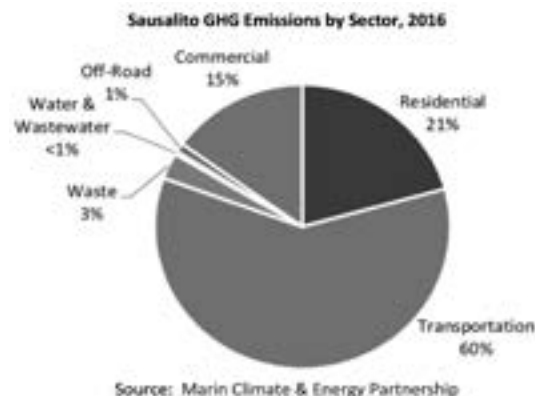
Thanks to the hard work of people establishing and running Marin Clean Energy/MCE, we now have access to more clean energy than ever before, and at affordable rates. But the percentage of Sausalito residents on MCE's Deep Green (100% Renewable Energy) program is embarrassingly small. Let's fix this and improve our Residential and Commercial emissions profile.

And as you'll see, Transportation is by far our largest emissions category, which is true across Sausalito, Marin County, and California. We must enact broad change now. And again, the good news is that new technologies make clean transportation affordable, easy, and more fun.

What we need to know: the recent Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change report confirmed that the impacts and costs of global warming will be far greater than expected. Just an increase of 1.5 degrees Celsius could be reached in as little as 11 years—and almost certainly within 20 years without major cuts in carbon dioxide (CO2) emissions. As the report makes clear, without the full involvement of all of us we will likely miss our target of limiting warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius.

What we need to do: take action now and make a difference:

1. Go to the MCE website and sign up for the Deep Green program. Make Sausalito a leader.
2. Your 2019 New Year's resolution should include driving a clean vehicle, helping reduce our largest emissions category. Electric vehicles are fun, quick, and quiet to drive. And it's much easier to plug in at home than waste time and money visiting gas stations. Visit Drive Clean Marin and take this important step.

FRAUDULENT IRS CALLS

Tax season is upon us again and the Sausalito Police Department has been contacted by several Sausalito residents who have received telephone calls from scammers claiming to be from the IRS. Unfortunately, this is a common scam and continues to be an issue even after tax season is over. Here are some tips directly from the IRS website (www.irs.gov) on how to identify a fictitious call from the IRS and how to proceed:

The IRS would like to remind citizens that these scams are easily detected when looking for the right clues. Here are five common approaches these scammers will often use and any one of these should be a warning sign of a possible scam.

The IRS will never:

- Call to demand immediate payment, nor will they call about a tax debt without prior written notification
- Demand that you pay taxes without providing information on an appeals process and payment plan information, etc.
- Require you to use a specific payment method, such as a prepaid debit card
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone
- Threaten to enlist local police or other law-enforcement agencies to have you arrested for not paying

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS and demanding immediate payment for a tax debt owed, do the following:

- If you owe taxes or think you might owe, call the IRS at **1-800-829-1040**. The IRS can help you determine if there is in fact a debt owed how to proceed.
- If you are certain you do not owe a tax debt, report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) at **1-800-366-4484** or at www.tigta.gov.
- You may also file a complaint using the FTC Complaint Assistant (www.ftccomplaintassistant.gov/); choose "Other" and then "Imposter Scams." If the complaint involves someone impersonating the IRS, include the words "IRS Telephone Scam" in the notes.

2018 marked our 30th year of the Sausalito-Sakaide Sister City Program, celebrating our ever-strengthening international friendship and mutual cultural respect and understanding between Japan and the United States. Through the Sausalito-Sakaide Sister City Program, the City of Sausalito welcomed 13 high school students from Sakaide, Japan for ten days of cultural and educational experiences that positively changed their lives forever. By the end of their stay in Sausalito, judging from the clinging hugs and restrained sobbing, they might as well have been family, and that's the point of our program. We bring people from opposite sides of the world together to form deep connections that will last a lifetime.

In commemoration of our 30th anniversary, Sausalito Mayor Joan Cox welcomed Sakaide Mayor Hiroshi Aya to Sausalito by presenting him with a key to the city. Later, during a country and western BBQ party hosted by the Bay Model, Mayor Cox deputized Mayor Aya as an honorary Sheriff of Sausalito. The 30th anniversary BBQ party also saw Sausalito's 2017 student delegation reunite with each other and co-mingle with their Sakaide counterparts, eventually ending in a huge line dancing party with a real line dancing caller. It was a wonderful night for students, families, friends, and city officials alike.

During their ten days in Sausalito and Marin, the students from Sakaide engaged in a wide range of diplomatic, educational, cultural, and physical activities from touring Autodesk's offices to meeting city officials to attending a Giants game to kayaking in Richardson Bay, all with regular morning English lessons. At the end of each day, the students return to their host families to spend some quality time together, usually over home cooked

meals. It's no wonder why these students become so attached.

Sausalito and Sakaide have fostered an official friendship that has lasted for over 30 years through the Sausalito-Sakaide Sister City Program. Every year, one city sends a group of high school students to the other, alternating between years. In 2018, families in Sausalito and Marin County hosted students from Sakaide and, in 2019, Sakaide will host students from Sausalito and Marin County.

Why do we do this? The Sausalito-Sakaide Sister City Program operates under the belief that these kinds of homestay and cultural exchange experiences change young minds in profoundly positive ways. Being out of their element encourages young people to think on their feet, be mindful of their surroundings, and build new friendships. Our goal is to help these young people see the world as one full of new friends and opportunities; a place to be explored, studied, and enjoyed.

We couldn't have done it without our fabulous Sister City board members, donors, supporters and volunteers. We are a volunteer-run non-profit organization built on the efforts and love of true believers who have witnessed first hand the transformative power of international friendships. We believe that if every city had a program like ours, the world would be a much more peaceful and friendly place. Until then, we must be the beacon for others to follow.

VINA DEL MAR, CHILE

Sister City October 2018 Exchange

Twelve Sausalito and Marin County business leaders traveled to Vina Del Mar October 2018 for the seventh exchange of our Women in Business mentoring program. We have been meeting both here in Sausalito and every other year in Vina Del Mar with government and business leaders, local community members, banking and other funding sources in support of our program for the Asociacion Gremial de Empresarias y Profesionales, Association of Business women and Professionals of the Valparaiso Region (AGEP) (www.agepv.cl)

Impact of VDM Program

The AGEP women have grown exponentially since our first meeting seven years ago. Their production this year of the First Congress of Latin American Business women is evidence of the acceptance by many in the governmental agencies, local community members, banks and funding sources of their unique presence and contributions to the Chilean society. Over 200 women business owners and leaders were in attendance including local Chilean business women from the south of Chilean and other nearby cities surrounding Vina Del Mar. Special guests from Dominican Republic, members from the US Embassy in Chile, University executives, banking and economic leaders all exhibited AGEPv growing prominence in the region. The team of 10 Uruguay business women who attended pledged in writing to continue to share best practices. They will meet again throughout the coming year with AGEP and all hope to attend the 2019 Global Women's conference in Lima Peru. A similar written agreement was executed with Dominican Republicans. The speakers from financial and political arenas expressed the impact of Chile globally, and commented on trade agreements with China being #1—USA being #2 trade partners. Some AGEP women are beginning to partner with Chinese manufactures who are importing to Chile.

Importance of our Continued Involvement

Our Sausalito/VDM connection is a very important global link for AGEP. Time and time again it was expressed how important the 7/7/7 women mentoring program is to open the eyes of these business women, to show them expanded ways of thinking, business insights and to experience life in the USA. The women who have experienced this USA exchange are returning to Chile and raising the bar for other AGEP members—sharing the concepts of women empowerment and self-sufficiency. Each AGEP member truly helps the other - in business advice, partnering and brainstorming for improving or problem solving. It is clear that life is not easy in Chile. These women have two and three businesses and also manage the family and household in most situations.

Mayor Joan Cox was part of this 2018 delegation and imparted strong words to the group about the importance of civic involvement and being a part of the change for improving policies and job development. Her presence and participation in meetings with VDM city council members and tourism executives fostered an invitation from Mayor Cox to Mayor Reginato for a visit to Sausalito in 2019 – the goal to further exchange ideas on our similarities and best practices for addressing earthquake preparedness, fire dangers, rising sea levels, and more. Both municipalities could learn from each other—another step towards deeper connections.

People-to-people people diplomacy

This program is clearly the poster child for accomplishing people to people outreach and a helping hand for growth within that sister city/country. The sharing of our Sausalito/USA practices with our workshops and presentations are clearly providing broader thinking for these business women. We visited 9 businesses and with each story saw their levels of improvement and could also offer our ideas for the next step. It is a rewarding and learning experience for both sides. Our workshop presenters included Aness Pogni (Soxilito), Lorna Newlin (Sausalito Pottery), Deana Kardel (Executive Coach), Cathy Stierhoff (CPA), Brenda DeBruyn (Professional/Marketing Coach and translator), Lizzie Jeremi (teacher and translator) Karen Aiken (Marketing Consultant) Jan Swanberg (Marketing Consultant) Susan Roe (Executive Management) Aria Pogni (2018 Loyola Graduate Entrepreneurial Program) Monica Finnegan (Investor/Real Estate and VDM Chair).

COMMUNITY PARTNERSHIPS ENHANCE STUDENT EXPERIENCE AT BAYSIDE MARTIN LUTHER KING, JR. ACADEMY

Bayside MLK serves transitional kindergarten through eighth grade. The focus for the school year is on culture and climate, and enhanced instruction. Bayside MLK students are demonstrating PRIDE - Pride, Respect, Integrity, Determination and Excellence!

The District's Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) names Community School as one of its four goals at Bayside MLK. The Community School development process is providing greater alignment between our community partners and our individual learning plans for students. These learning plans are designed to encompass everything from academics and cultural relevancy to social and emotional supports for students and families.

Several community partnerships offer systems of support designed to enable our students to build upon a strong sense of pride in themselves, their school, their community and their culture.

The school district is collaborating with Performing Stars/Phoenix Project. This partnership provides additional staff support and community collaboration to develop a shared vision for services that includes cultural competence by building the capacity of caregivers, administrators and teachers to respond to the social-emotional needs of their students through trainings, participation in coordination of services, and linkage to resources.

Through a partnership with the Marin County Library through the Marin City Library, the school's library has received a fresh new look with culturally relevant library books and materials.

The Sausalito Marin City School Board approved a Strategic Arts Education Five Year Plan for BMLK students. The Arts Education Plan was developed through a collaboration with the Center for Excellence, a non-profit

organization dedicated to serving the students of Bayside MLK through the arts. The Strategic Arts Education Five Year Plan aligns with the district's Local Control and Accountability Plan by laying out goals, strategies, and budgetary targets for providing BMLK students with arts education and tools intended to also spark excellence in the other core academic areas and, ultimately, instill a passion that will motivate students through high school and beyond.

Collaborations with Willow Creek Academy Charter School continue around staff and student supports. While our school agencies are independent from each other, we benefit from sharing wherever it benefits and strengthens both schools. For example, we collaborate on cross-agency support for students who transition between our two schools, as well as ninth grade transitional support for eighth graders from both Bayside MLK and Willow Creek Academy who are set to graduate to the Tamalpais Union High School District.

Bayside MLK has an instructional coach to increase high quality teaching and learning and instructional alignment from class to class and grade to grade. Our commitment is to enhancing student engagement and improving student learning across the board through evidence-based instructional strategies and data-driven instruction. We are determined to overcome the achievement and opportunity gaps, and to ensure a successful pathway to college and other postsecondary opportunities.

Some of the new assets that are benefitting the classroom experience: stand up desks (generously donated by Stand for Kids) and meditation.

With the support of community partners there's a lot going on this year and the future looks very bright.

The Marin Headlands is stunning in the fall and winter, with cooler days, less fog and seasonal drama! And of course, numerous hiking trails await!

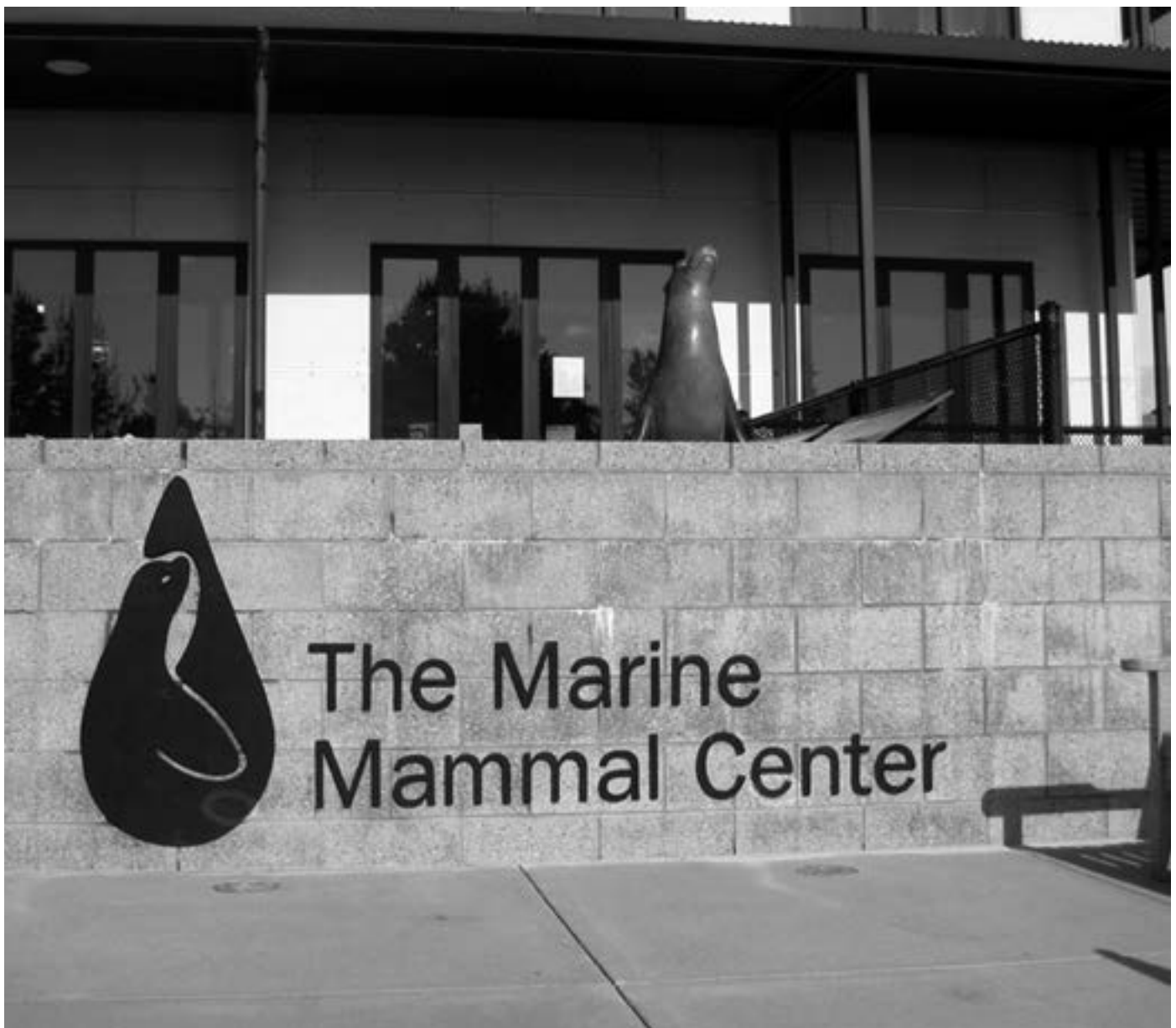

The founding circle interviewed architects and raised funds to build what became their beautiful Clubhouse. They chose the up-and-coming Julia Morgan, California's first licensed female architect, to design the building.

That first September the local newspaper invited the town to the Grand Opening, which included hors d'oeuvres, dancing and music. The Club has been active in the Sausalito community and beyond ever since.

Early on, members donated funds to help purchase the land for Mount Tamalpias State Park, to support Save the Redwoods League, and they even helped a young member return to Europe to serve the Red Cross.

Over the last 62 years, the Club's Scholarship Recognition Fund has distributed more than \$1,000,000 in scholarships to young people living in the 94965 zip code to help them reach their educational and personal goals.

As President of the Sausalito Woman's Club, I have dedicated my year to raising funds—just as they did 100 years ago—to keep Sausalito's #1 Historical Site and National Register of Historical Places in good repair.

Our goal is \$100,000 to commemorate 100 years on Central Avenue, and as of **December 31** we are more than halfway there.

On Sunday, **April 7**, we will host a community party to celebrate the Clubhouse Centennial and close out our campaign. Just like in 1920, there will be delicious food, music, and maybe a bit of dancing.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Sausalito Chamber of Commerce is a 501 (c) 6 nonprofit organization. While we work closely with the city to help promote, sustain and grow our community we are not a civic organization or an arm of the City of Sausalito. The chamber is funded by members that pay dues; typically a business, organization, association, club or individual that supports our mission statement and recognizes the benefits of being a member.

The Board of Directors is composed of twelve members that donate their time and effort for the benefit of the community. These directors usually serve a three year term.

Over the past five years, the Sausalito Chamber of Commerce has staffed the Visitors Kiosk with Chamber Members sponsoring over \$65,000 of the cost and the Chamber contributing over \$35,000. This funding covers paid kiosk staff, free WiFi for visitors & the community, Visit Sausalito website hosting and maintenance. Funds come from chamber membership and fundraising events each year. Kiosk staff help with overall congestion mitigation in downtown Sausalito along with directing visitors to restaurants, hotel, retail businesses and galleries.

Current Kiosk sponsors include Aquarium of the Bay, Angelino's Restaurant, Bay City Bike Rentals, Big Bus Tour of San Francisco, Casa Madrona Hotel, City of Sausalito, Cavallo Point, Gallery Sausalito, Lappert's Ice Cream, Madrigal Family Winery, Salito's Crab House & Prime Rib, Scoma's Sausalito, Seafood Peddler, Sports & History Gallery, The Inn Above Tide, The Spinnaker and The Trident. We appreciate the support of businesses who recognize the benefit of having a Visitors Kiosk at the ferry landing.

Over the past three years the Chamber has also contributed funding to the bike queuing along the ferry landing. Total Chamber funding over the past three years has been \$20,000, these funds come from fundraising events. The ferry companies and a few of the bike companies have also assisted in staff expenses from April – September.

The Sausalito Chamber is an integral part of keeping Sausalito running on a daily basis while supporting our members and the entire community.
