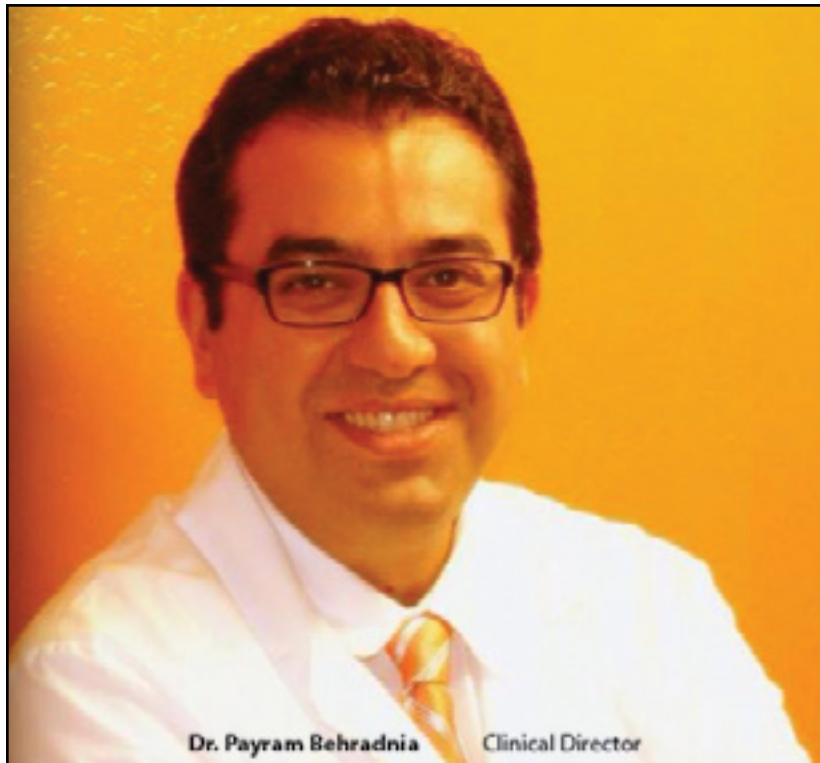

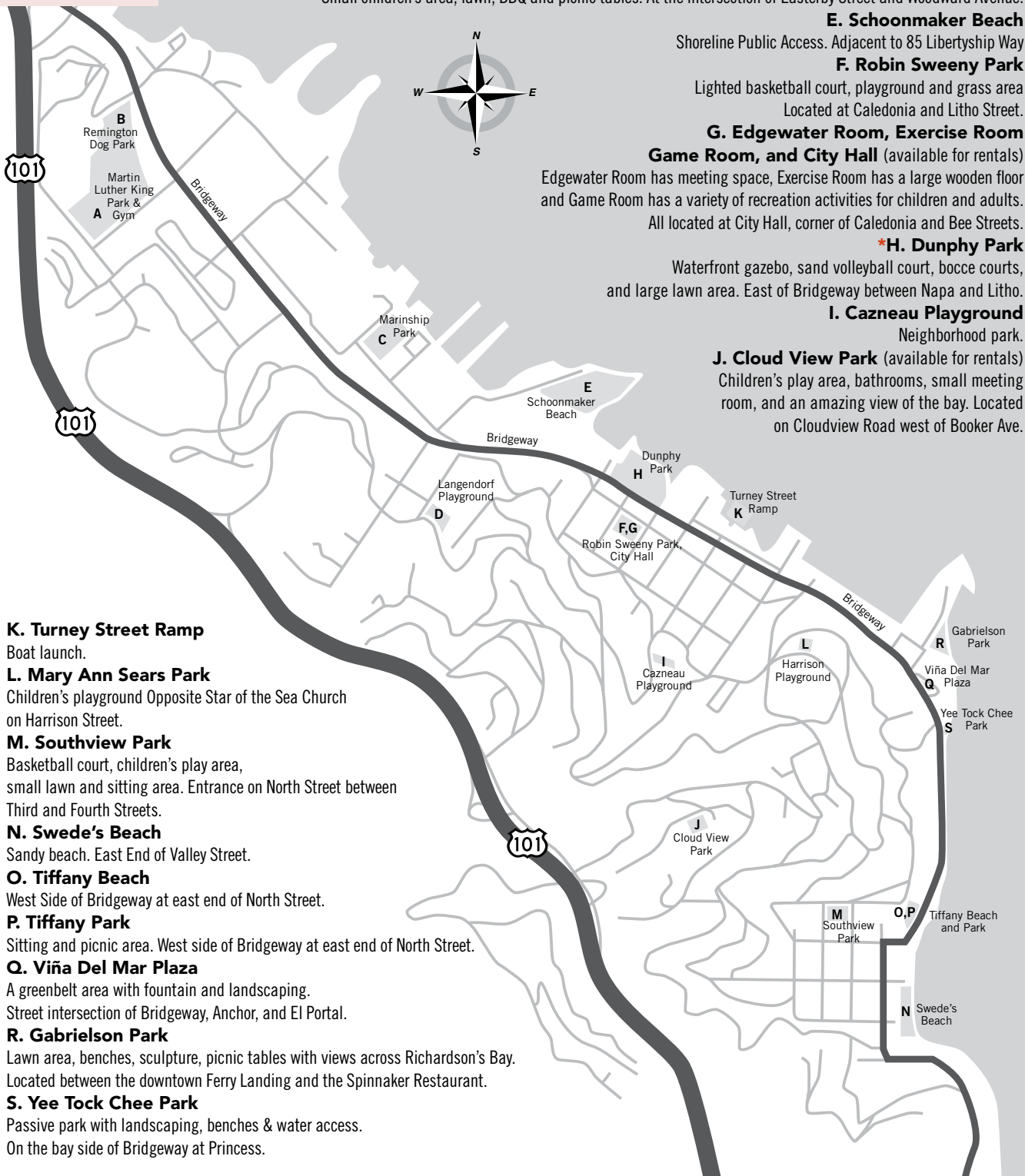

## Library Services

### Get a Library Card Without Visiting the Library

Online registration for a full-access library card is available for Marin County residents aged 16 years or older. When you apply online, you'll get immediate access to popular digital services like movies from Kanopy, and e-books from OverDrive. A valid credit card with a Marin County billing address is required for address verification purposes only. Your credit card will not be charged. To obtain a library card, go to the Sausalito Library webpage and look for "Get a Library Card" under About Us.

### E-Books and E-Audiobooks

The Sausalito Library offers a huge online collection of popular electronic books and e-audiobooks for adults and children through the OverDrive service. If you're not familiar with these resources, please look for the OverDrive button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage or download OverDrive's Libby app to your mobile device. A large collection of popular audiobooks is also available on the Hoopla platform (see below). If you need extra assistance, we are available to help you get set up on your smartphone, tablet, laptop, iPad, Kindle, or e-reading device. ### Streaming Movies and More with Kanopy and Hoopla

The Sausalito Library offers two streaming video services that are free to Sausalito residents. Kanopy ([sausalito.kanopystreaming.com](http://sausalito.kanopystreaming.com)) is a collection of thousands of independent, classic, documentary, and foreign films, including Paramount classics and films from the Criterion Collection of world cinema. Think of it as a free version of Netflix. Hoopla (**[www.hoopladigital.com](http://www.hoopladigital.com)**) features an eclectic selection of Hollywood and independent movies, as well as comics, e-books, music, and e-audiobooks. Both Kanopy and Hoopla can be accessed with your Sausalito library card via app, the library website, or the web addresses above. If you have any trouble using Kanopy, Hoopla, or any of the other digital collections offered by the Sausalito Library, please contact City Librarian Abbot Chambers at **achambers@sausalito.gov** or **415-289-4123**.

### New York Times Online

Did you know that you can get free online access to the *New York Times* through the library? By obtaining a special code via the library website and creating an account with the New York Times using your email address, you can receive a 24-hour, unlimited-access pass. Just look for the New York Times button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage to get started. There is no limit to the number of times you can generate a 24-hour pass. The service will work for smartphones and tablets, as well as laptop and desktop computers. ### Unlimited Access to Lynda.com

Sausalito residents have access to the vast collection of online training courses and video tutorials available from Lynda.com—all you need is a library card. The courses and tutorials are taught by subject experts and cover everything from using your iPhone, to online marketing, to playing the electric guitar. ### High-Speed Internet

The Sausalito Library's free public internet service went from slow to blazing fast in 2017, when the library connected to CalREN, the California Research and Education Network. The change affects the public computers in the library and the public Wi-Fi available in the library and City Hall. At the library's public internet stations, where download speeds had previously been in the range of 5 to 10 megabits per second (Mbps), users now see speeds topping out at 500 Mbps. The library's free wireless network (called "library") has also gotten a big speed boost, to over 100 Mbps. Some mobile devices may see slower speeds due to hardware limitations.

### Online Archive of Sausalito Newspapers

Thanks to grants from the Sausalito Library Foundation and the Sausalito Historical Society, the library is able to offer online access to digital archives of the *Sausalito News* from 1885 to 1966 and the Sausalito *Marin Scope* from 1971 to 2010. The archive may be searched and browsed via the California Digital Newspaper Collection, which is maintained by the University of California, Riverside. You can find the archives online at **[cdnc.ucr.edu](http://cdnc.ucr.edu)**, or via the Services section of the library website. Digital archives of the *Marin Scope* from 2011 to present are available to users inside the Sausalito Library.

### Library Email Newsletters

There's a lot going on at the Sausalito Library! To help local residents stay on top of things, the library has two email newsletters, one covering all library programs and services, the other focused entirely on children's services. ### Museum Passes

Discover & Go is an online service you can use to reserve and print free and discount passes to Bay Area museums and cultural institutions like the Asian Art Museum, the Exploratorium, and the California Academy of Sciences. Look for the Discover & Go button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage to access the service. Please note that tickets for popular museums may not be available unless booked well in advance. ### Free Admission Tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor

In addition to the Discover & Go online service, the library offers free general admission tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. Every adult library card holder living in Sausalito is entitled to one ticket per year (each ticket admits two adults). Tickets are purchased through grants from the Friends of the Library and the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation.

### Borrow a California State Parks Vehicle Day Pass

Thanks to a generous gift of the family and friends of Lisa Kimberly Nunn York, the library has two "Golden Poppy" California State Parks vehicle day passes available to the public. The passes provide free vehicle admission and parking at over one hundred state parks, beaches, and recreation areas, including area parks like Mount Tamalpais, China Camp, and Samuel P. Taylor. To borrow a pass, look for one of the Golden Poppy cases in the central display area of the Sausalito Public Library. Bring the case to the service desk with your library card, and you can check out a storage bag containing the pass and information about California State Parks. Passes circulate for seven days and are not renewable. To ensure that a pass is available and save yourself a trip to the library, call the Reference Desk at **415-289-4121** — if a pass is available, we can set it aside for you for up to two hours.

### Ancestry

The popular genealogy software tool Ancestry is available for use on the library's public computers. Ancestry features censuses, vital records, immigration records, family histories, military records, court and legal documents, directories, photos, maps, and more. ### Home Delivery Program

The Sausalito Library offers a home delivery service of library materials using volunteer drivers from Call a Ride for Sausalito Seniors (CARSS). Participation in this program is free and open to residents of Sausalito and the floating home community who are 60 years of age or older, and to younger adults with a disability. If you are interested in having books, movies, or audiobooks delivered to your door, you will need to fill out a short application and sign a liability waiver, in addition to being a library card holder. All CARSS drivers have been vetted by Verified Volunteers. The service is available Monday through Friday, 10am to 2pm. ## PROTECT YOURSELF FROM PHONE SCAMS

Phone scams of all kinds are getting more common. The scammers generally prey on the generosity of people or through fear. Phone number “spoofing” technology and robocalling has made these scams more sophisticated and harder to detect. The Sausalito Police Department wants to help its community members better identify scams and reinforce how to respond to them.

Recently, the Sausalito Police Department received reports that the main police department phone number (415-289-4170) has been spoofed by an unknown entity and used in an attempted phone scam. These scammers identified themselves as law enforcement and IRS Agents. These scammers use aggressive tactics and threaten some form of judicial punishment if you do not comply with their request. These threats include telling you a warrant will be issued for your arrest or an officer will come to your house to arrest you immediately.

Some other current and common phone scams include:

- Threatening calls from the IRS
- Technical support calls
- Fake charity calls
- Lottery scams
- Family members in peril requiring money
- Website password scams

Please remember:

- That scams exist—you must be wary
- If you receive an unsolicited call and suspect it is fraudulent, hang up and call the source yourself to ensure you are speaking to a legitimate employee.
- Law enforcement agencies or the IRS will not ask for any form of payment over the phone.
- Bitcoin and money card requests are scam-related and should not be purchased
- Do not give any personal information or passwords over the phone to unknown sources through unsolicited calls
- Do not open suspicious texts, pop-up windows or attachments
- Don't allow anyone to remotely access your computer
- Be wary of unusual payments requests

## VINA DEL MAR, CHILE

### 7 WOMEN, 7 DAYS, 7 DREAMS

The cornerstone of our Viña del Mar Sister City program is a women-in-business mentoring series. Our operations council has created and presented a succession of workshops, seminars and exercises for AGEP (Asociación Gremial de Empresarias y Profesionales), a group of women business owners in the Viña del Mar/Valparaiso region. Every other year, we travel to Viña to present our workshops and participate in a variety of cultural experiences. The next year, which happens to be this fall, a group of 7 women from Chile come to Sausalito for the same. Beginning August 27, our visitors will be here for seven days loaded with a little hard work, a lot of learning, and heaps of fun, all ending in solid strategies and ideas that they can take back to their own businesses in Chile. We call this week *7 Women, 7 Days, 7 Dreams*.

For the first time since this exchange started in 2013, the women will be here during the Sausalito Art Festival. In fact, one of them, Britania Salinas Mayne, known as Mitty, was juried in and will have a booth at the Festival showing her beautiful oil paintings! So we're planning a true only-in-Sausalito experience: each of the women will serve a volunteer shift every day during the Festival!

Once the Festival is over, we'll jump right into three days of seminars and workshops. The theme this year is Leadership for Change, Empowerment to Innovate, Collaborate to Succeed. New this year is that on one afternoon, we will pair each of the seven women with business owners here in the same or similar business. In this way, they'll have the opportunity for more in-

depth discussions about challenges, pitfalls, and successes in each of their respective businesses.

This year's program will be another success in part due to the cooperation and collaboration of many individuals and local businesses. We look forward to thanking everyone and giving a full account in our next quarter report!

Fire! Our next scheduled subject for the SHS Exhibit Room in Sausalito's City Hall will be: "Fire!" This exhibit and library talk will look at the history of fires, firemen, and fire prevention in Sausalito. The exhibit will open in September in the Sausalito Historical Society Exhibit room on the third floor of City Hall. The room is open Wednesdays and Saturdays, 10am–1pm

Through the end of August, our City Hall Exhibit Room features a show on Enid Foster and her art. In the 1950s, Enid Foster stood at the center of Sausalito's art colony, a magic world of poetry, performance and visual wonder that owed as much to her powerful personality as it did to her brilliant art. In another time, that magic might have brought her fame, but in the 1950s, her art was too far beyond the mainstream. The curators, critics and gallery owners who had recognized her as an internationally important sculptor thirty years before now only saw Sausalito's town character: a white-haired, 60-year-old in frayed blue jeans, beat-up tennis shoes and a railroad man's work shirt walking an old dog through town on her way to the bookstore. She was an amusing eccentric who made irrelevant art. The Sausalito Historical Society Exhibit on Enid Foster will open on March 29th and run through the end of September. The exhibit is on the third floor of the Sausalito City Hall in the Sausalito Historical Society's exhibit room. The exhibit room is open Wednesday's and Saturdays from 10am to 1pm.

### EXHIBIT LOCATIONS

The Society staffs and manages the Ice House Visitor Center and Museum featuring a permanent display of local history. There is also a gift area featuring works of art by local artists and a selection of gift items relating to Sausalito and its history. The Ice House is open from 11:30am–4pm on Tuesday through Sunday, and is located at 780 Bridgeway (across from Casa Madrona). **415-332-0505** Visit the Historical Society's Exhibit Room and the Phil Frank History and Research Room on the top floor of City Hall. A team of dedicated Docents are available to assist and guide you. Check out exhibits such as 'The Sausalito that Never Was,' (see above for details), or utilize our Archives to explore your home's history, the Marinship during WWII, and other moments in Sausalito's history. The Exhibit and Research Rooms are open from 10am–1pm on Wednesdays and Saturdays, and are located at 420 Litho Street. The Marinship Exhibit is open from 9am–4pm on Tuesday through Saturday and is located in the Bay Model Visitors Center at 2100 Bridgeway. **415-332-3871**

# Sausalito/Marin City Schools

## INTRODUCING THE SAUSALITO/MARIN CITY SCHOOLS SUPERINTENDENT, ITOCO GARCIA, Ed.D.

It is a dream come true to be named superintendent of the Sausalito Marin City School District. I grew up as a bilingual, bicultural, and multiracial Latino kid in Mill Valley. Sausalito and Marin City were instrumental to my personal and professional development and trajectory. Pedaling hundreds of miles on the bike path from Mill Valley toward Sausalito created indelible images in my childhood memory—fun-filled summers at the Sausalito Yacht Club, burgers at 737 Bridgeway, gobstoppers from the Candy Shop, and pizza and video games at Dario's. My granddad, who arrived here in the '60s, started one of our most cherished family traditions: birthday and other celebratory dinners at The Spinnaker.

I started spending even more time in Sausalito at the age of eleven. Growing up as a mixed-race kid without my dad meant many different people mentored me. David Hall was my first football coach, and Connie Knutson and Tim Grayson coached me in Babe Ruth. I spent countless hours taking swings and shagging flies at the old MLK field, and I made a lot of close friends who grew up in Marin City, Kappas Marina, and from all over Sausalito. This was the first place where I felt accepted, where it felt like I fit, and where people treated me like family. These relationships were built on a foundation of teamwork, great meals, laughter, and spending nights on Buckelew Street, in different buildings in Golden Gate Village, and even on a few houseboats. After I graduated from UC Berkeley with a B.A., I worked for Bank of America in Sausalito and helped many small local businesses secure lines of credit and small business loans.

I received several gifts from this community that were instrumental to my successful twenty-year career as a transformative educator in Deep East Oakland, West Oakland, and Hayward. The cultural and linguistic competencies and literacies developed growing up in this community, along with a knowledge of self, of my own identity, and an appreciation and openness for diverse communities were critical to my personal and professional success. A few other experiences drove me to become an

educator. I often felt rejected at school, not so much by my peers but by teachers and staff. I became acutely aware of the difference in educational experience between myself and many of the kids I grew up with, something that never seemed fair or just to me. These experiences motivated me to become an educator. I was sure there was a different way to teach and for students to learn—a way that would validate and affirm all students and their families. I spent ten years honing my skill as a kindergarten teacher and, while earning my MA in teaching from Fresno State, managed to transform outcomes for many kids in the Highland, Stonehurst, and Fairview communities. I then became an instructional coach and started working to develop these skills in other teachers at MLK in West Oakland. My career as an administrator began at Claremont Middle School in the Rockridge district in Oakland and culminated at Cherryland Elementary School in unincorporated southern Alameda county. We built a nationally recognized community school, and achieved state level recognition for our work on school culture and climate. We also made the single biggest improvement of any elementary school in Hayward, from the old state test to the new Common Core-aligned exam. We passed a school construction bond and designed a \$56 million educational complex specifically designed to engage the community and allow teachers and students the space necessary to collaborate and engage in project-based, arts-integrated learning. During this time I finished my Ed.D. in the Leaders for Educational Equity Program at UC Berkeley. I have had the opportunity over the last two years to work in twelve different school districts across two states, setting up systems and structures to improve academic achievement and school climate. I am overjoyed that I can take what I have learned about creating successful urban schools and transforming outcomes for students and families, and apply it here in the place that made many of these things possible for me.

I am eager to deepen my existing relationships and create new ones so we can begin to heal and unite behind a common vision. I strongly believe we can create one of the highest-performing schools in the country. I'm incredibly excited about actualizing the strategic vision of the Board of Trustees to create an arts-integrated, social justice-focused, full-service community school. I will work tirelessly to listen to all members of our community, and collaboratively develop a common vision regarding what it means to be made in Sausalito and Marin City.

## A CHOICE FOR MANY FAMILIES

Although LFSF is the first choice of many French and francophone parents in the Bay Area, it also attracts diverse and internationally minded families who want to give their child the gift of bilingualism.

Ryan and Emily made the LFSF choice for their son Andrew when they elected to enroll him in La Petite Ecole, the part-time program offered on the Sausalito campus for age 2 children. After two years, they are sharing their experience.

“Our family has been a member of the Lycée community since January 2018. We relocated from Cincinnati, Ohio, and have always been interested in bilingual immersion programs for our son, Andrew, after we traveled the world for three months and only knew English! Andrew had been attending a well-regarded independent private school in Cincinnati so we wanted to find a similar fit in Marin and hoped for a language immersion option.

Cincinnati offered no preschool language immersion programs so when we considered job options in Chicago, Boston and San Francisco we sought out bilingual programs at independent private schools. After visiting 10+ programs across the United States, Lycée stood out to us as one of the top private bilingual schools available.

Andrew started in the new La Petite Ecole program knowing no French other than *bonjour* and *merci*. After 4 months he was singing French songs. This year in the Petite Section he is learning to count, tell the days of week and speak sentences in French all while enhancing his English speaking and comprehension skills. On top of the language benefits, the maternelle program has specifically taught key skills including:

- Socialization and respecting friends
- Independence
- Science concepts through hands on STEAM activities
- Hands-on cooking which teaches vocabulary, counting and teamwork
- Handwriting & pre-reading skills
- Outdoor exploration, gardening and play
- Fine motor skills through “motricity”
- Expression through art-based activities including painting, drawing, music and sensory play

## LYCÉE IS SET APART FROM OTHER SCHOOLS BY ITS AMAZING TEACHERS AND STAFF.

Each teacher/staff member is committed to Andrew's success. He is known by everyone at the school by name. The librarian saves favorite books for him, and the teachers know his favorite things (construction and trains of course). Such care and compassion enable Andrew to love school every day which we believe will be a foundation towards lifelong learning.

We have been very impressed with the school and were excited to know that parental involvement is encouraged. Ryan is a member of the school governance council, Conseil d'Etablissement, and Emily is the head room parent for the Sausalito campus.

To round out our Lycée experience we are taking French classes through the school. Andrew says that we need to work harder on our French but appreciates that we are trying :)”

The Bay Model partnered with the Marin Chapter of the Native Plant Society in developing the garden after it was decided their native plant exhibit would be featured in the gallery in April and May. The Native Plant Society has provided all the expertise in regards to species of plant, irrigation and rock features. Visitors interested in planting native plants at home can read signage and printed material for easy instructions. The garden will be a permanent Bay Model feature and hopefully bring lots of butterflies and hummingbirds to the area for all to enjoy for many years to come. We welcome you to come by and check it out.

## Rotary Club of Sausalito

Chartered in June 1948, the Rotary Club of Sausalito has been an integral part of the civic and charitable life of Sausalito for 71 years. Sausalito Rotary has been the driving force in Senior Housing in the city and has initiated, completed a host of community projects and been a leader in global humanitarian efforts

The Club is the sponsor of three 501(c)3 nonprofit corporations including:

1. the Rotary Housing Corp, which developed, constructed and manages two senior housing communities offering below market rate apartments to seniors in the community. Currently the rental rates are approximately half of the market rents in Sausalito.
2. The Rotary Club of Sausalito Educational Scholarship Fund, which provides vocational scholarships to deserving students. Many of these students are single mothers seeking a better life for their children.
3. Rotary Club of Sausalito Charitable Foundation, which holds annual fund-raising events that benefit the community and global humanitarian efforts.

The Club's local efforts have resulted in the construction of Marinship Park, the improvements of bus stops, signage programs, walking paths, cleaning and improving parks and helping citizens with various household tasks. RCS also holds an annual Thanksgiving luncheon for seniors in Sausalito and Marin City. Currently, the Rotary Club is the sponsor of a \$400,000 grant application to restore the fishing pier next to the Trident restaurant.

Internationally, the Club is partnering with the Rotary Club of Hoedspruit, South Africa to provide funding for a woman's health clinic in the Kruger area of South Africa to provide cervical and breast cancer screening for low income women. Many of these women are refugees from Mozambique and Zimbabwe and have no access to health care.

RCS holds two major fundraising events during the year – parking at the Sausalito Art Festival and an annual Gala, which honors and contributes funds to non-Rotarian nonprofits in Sausalito. The gala has provided needed funds to the Sausalito Historical Society, Sausalito Beautiful and the Sausalito Sister Cities organization. This year's Gala is in partnership with the Sausalito Woman's Club to be held in April 2020. All proceeds from these events are donated to our humanitarian efforts, locally and internationally.

The Rotary Club of Sausalito meets every Thursday at noon at the Sausalito Yacht Club. The cost for lunch is \$20 and the public is invited to attend. Other changes include the layout and design of the festival grounds. Look for "Hangouts"—a lot more space to sit and sip in the shade. A cool waterfront VIP area. ## Sausalito Woman's Club

One hundred years ago this April, the Sausalito Woman's Club was enjoying its first year in their brand new clubhouse overlooking the San Francisco Bay.

The founders had incorporated as a Woman's Club five years earlier, and had been using a variety of Sausalito's meeting spaces for their gatherings. Frederick Robins, husband of founding member, Grace McGregor Robbins, donated the property at 120 Central Avenue in memory of his late wife.

The founding circle interviewed architects and raised funds to build what became their beautiful Clubhouse. They chose the up-and-coming Julia Morgan, California's first licensed female architect, to design the building.

That first September the local newspaper invited the town to the Grand Opening, which included hors d'oeuvres, dancing and music. The Club has been active in the Sausalito community and beyond ever since.

Early on, members donated funds to help purchase the land for Mount Tamalpias State Park, to support Save the Redwoods League, and they even helped a young member return to Europe to serve the Red Cross.

Over the last 62 years, the Club's Scholarship Recognition Fund has distributed more than \$1,000,000 in scholarships to young people living in the 94965 zip code to help them reach their educational and personal goals.

As President of the Sausalito Woman's Club, I have dedicated my year to raising funds—just as they did 100 years ago—to keep Sausalito's #1 Historical Site and National Register of Historical Places in good repair.

**Thanks to our generous supporters, we have reached our goal of \$100,000 to commemorate 100 years on Central Avenue!**
