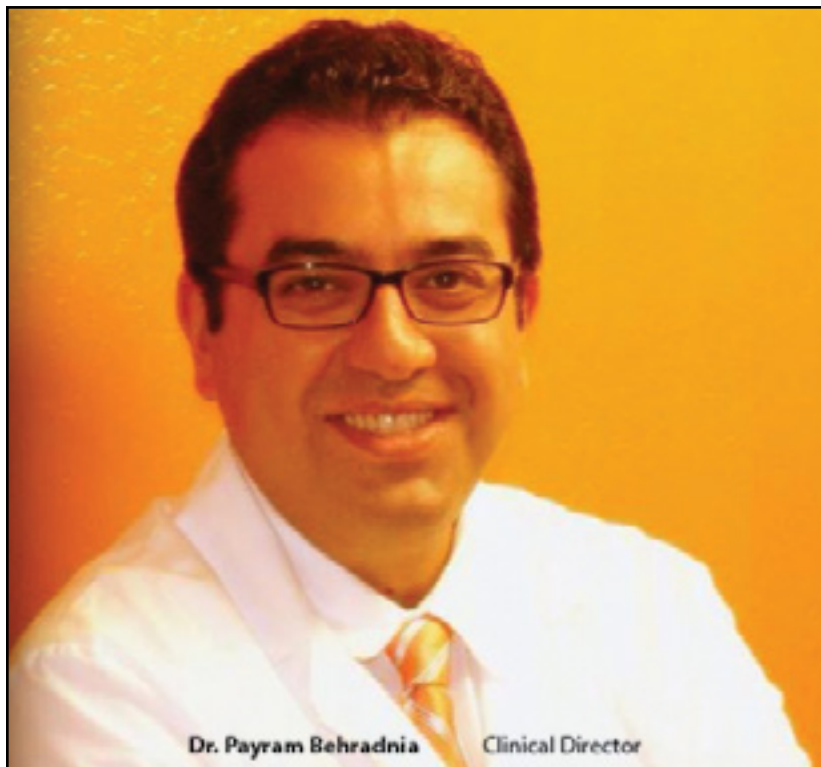
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Message from the

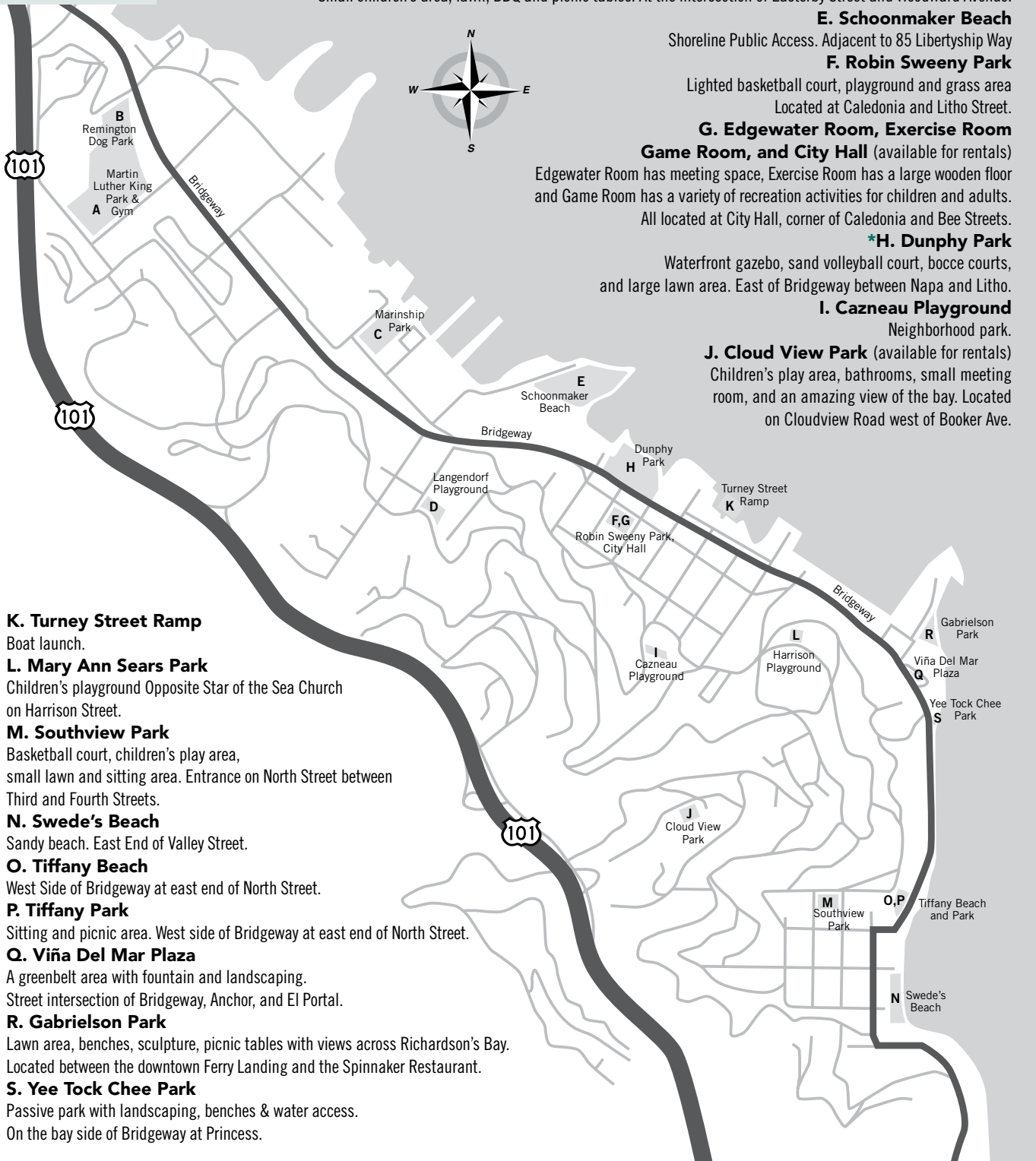

Library Services

Get a Library Card Without Visiting the Library

Online registration for a full-access library card is available for Marin County residents aged 16 years or older. When you apply online, you'll get immediate access to popular digital services like movies from Kanopy and e-books from OverDrive. A valid credit card with a Marin County billing address is required for address verification purposes only. Your credit card will not be charged. To obtain a library card, go to the Sausalito Library webpage and look for "Get a Library Card" under About Us.

E-Books and E-Audiobooks

The Sausalito Library offers a huge online collection of popular electronic books and e-audiobooks for adults and children through the OverDrive service. If you're not familiar with these resources, please look for the OverDrive button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage or download OverDrive's Libby app to your mobile device. A large collection of popular audiobooks is also available on the Hoopla platform (see below). If you need extra assistance, we are available to help you get set up on your smartphone, tablet, laptop, iPad, Kindle, or e-reading device. Streaming Movies and More with Kanopy and Hoopla

The Sausalito Library offers two streaming video services that are free to Sausalito residents. Kanopy (sausalito.kanopystreaming.com) is a collection of thousands of independent, classic, documentary, and foreign films, including Paramount classics and films from the Criterion Collection of world cinema. Think of it as a free version of Netflix. Hoopla (www.hoopladigital.com) features an eclectic selection of Hollywood and independent movies, as well as comics, e-books, music, and e-audiobooks. Both Kanopy and Hoopla can be accessed with your Sausalito library card via app, the library website, or the web addresses above. If you have any trouble using Kanopy, Hoopla, or any of the other digital collections offered by the Sausalito Library, please contact City Librarian Abbot Chambers at **achambers@sausalito.gov** or **415-289-4123**.

New York Times Online

Did you know that you can get free online access to the *New York Times* through the library? By obtaining a special code via the library website and creating an account with the *New York Times* using your email address, you can receive a 24-hour unlimited-access pass. Just look for the *New York Times* button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage to get started. There is no limit to the number of times you can generate a 24-hour pass. The service will work for smartphones and tablets, as well as laptop and desktop computers. If you have questions or receive an error message when logging in, please contact Augie Webb at **awebb@sausalito.gov**.

High-Speed Internet

The Sausalito Library's free public internet service went from slow to blazing fast in 2017, when the library connected to CalREN, the California Research and Education Network. At the library's public internet stations, where download speeds had previously been in the range of 5 to 10 megabits per second (Mbps), users now see speeds topping out at 500 Mbps. The library's free wireless network (called "library") has also gotten a big speed boost, to over 100 Mbps. Some mobile devices may see slower speeds due to hardware limitations.

Online Archive of Sausalito Newspapers

Thanks to grants from the Sausalito Library Foundation and the Sausalito Historical Society, the library is able to offer online access to digital archives of the *Sausalito News* from 1885 to 1966 and the *Sausalito Marin Scope* from 1971 to 2010. The archive may be searched and browsed via the California Digital Newspaper Collection, which is maintained by the University of California, Riverside. You can find the archives on the web at **cdnc.ucr.edu**, or via the Services section of the library website. Digital archives of the *Marin Scope* from 2011 to present are available to users inside the Sausalito Library.

Library Email Newsletters

There's a lot going on at the Sausalito Library! To help local residents stay on top of things, the library has two email newsletters, one covering all library programs and services, the other focused entirely on children's services. Library e-newsletters are sent out once every two weeks.

Museum Passes

Discover & Go is an online service you can use to reserve and print free and discount passes to Bay Area museums and cultural institutions like the Asian Art Museum, the Exploratorium, and the California Academy of Sciences. Look for the Discover & Go button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage to access the service. Please note that tickets for popular museums may not be available unless booked well in advance. Free Admission Tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor

In addition to the Discover & Go online service, the library offers free general admission tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. Every adult library card holder living in Sausalito is entitled to one ticket per year (each ticket admits two adults). Tickets are purchased through grants from the Friends of the Library and the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation.

Borrow a California State Parks Vehicle Day Pass

The library has two "Golden Poppy" California State Parks vehicle day passes available to the public. The passes provide free vehicle admission and parking at over one hundred state parks, beaches, and recreation areas, including area parks like Mount Tamalpais, China Camp, and Samuel P. Taylor. To borrow a pass, look for one of the Golden Poppy cases in the central display area of the Sausalito Public Library. Bring the case to the service desk with your library card, and you can check out a storage bag containing the pass and information about California State Parks. Passes circulate for seven days and are not renewable. To ensure that a pass is available and save yourself a trip to the library, call the Reference Desk at **415-289-4121**. If a pass is available, we can set it aside for you for up to two hours.

Ancestry

The popular genealogy software tool Ancestry is available for use on the library's public computers. Ancestry features censuses, vital records, immigration records, family histories, military records, court and legal documents, directories, photos, maps, and more. If you have any questions about Ancestry, please contact the Reference Desk at **415-289-4121** or reference@sausalito.gov.

Home Delivery Program

The Sausalito Library offers a home delivery service of library materials using volunteer drivers from Call a Ride for Sausalito Seniors (CARSS). Participation in this program is free and open to residents of Sausalito and the floating home community who are 60 years of age or older, and to younger adults with a disability. If you are interested in having books, movies, or audiobooks delivered to your door, you will need to fill out a short application and sign a liability waiver, in addition to being a library card holder. All CARSS drivers have been vetted by Verified Volunteers. The service is available Monday through Friday, 10am to 2pm. PROTECT YOURSELF FROM PHONE SCAMS

Phone scams of all kinds are getting more common. The scammers generally prey on the generosity of people or through fear. Phone number “spoofing” technology and robocalling has made these scams more sophisticated and harder to detect. The Sausalito Police Department wants to help its community members better identify scams and reinforce how to respond to them.

Recently, the Sausalito Police Department received reports that the main police department phone number (**415-289-4170**) has been spoofed by an unknown entity and used in an attempted phone scam. These scammers identified themselves as law enforcement and IRS Agents. These scammers use aggressive tactics and threaten some form of judicial punishment if you do not comply with their request. These threats include telling you a warrant will be issued for your arrest or an officer will come to your house to arrest you immediately.

Some other current and common phone scams include:

- Threatening calls from the IRS
- Technical support calls
- Fake charity calls
- Lottery scams
- Family members in peril requiring money
- Website password scams

Please remember:

- That scams exist—you must be wary
- If you receive an unsolicited call and suspect it is fraudulent, hang up and call the source yourself to ensure you are speaking to a legitimate employee.
- Law enforcement agencies or the IRS will not ask for any form of payment over the phone.
- Bitcoin and money card requests are scam-related and should not be purchased
- Do not give any personal information or passwords over the phone to unknown sources through unsolicited calls
- Do not open suspicious texts, pop-up windows or attachments
- Don't allow anyone to remotely access your computer
- Be wary of unusual payments requests

Sausalito was the first City in Marin to join the World Health Organization (WHO) in 2014 and joined AARP Livable Communities in 2017. In 2013 Age Friendly Sausalito began their work with an assessment survey sent to all residents 55 and older. The response was overwhelming with 50% being returned. That information helped Age Friendly Sausalito to develop programs such as CARSS (Call A Ride for Sausalito Seniors), the Age Friendly Building Permit program, One Big Chore Day, the pedestrian crosswalk flags, the new walking path and age friendly outdoor exercise equipment at MLK Park.

Age Friendly Sausalito is now developing a follow up survey to determine how the programs have helped older adults in our community over the last six years. We are particularly interested in the gaps in services and supports that we can work to improve going forward.

If you are 55 and older, please watch for the Age Friendly Sausalito Community Evaluation Survey coming to your mailbox. Your voice is important and we want to hear from you.

FALLS – don't let them happen to you!

Falls are the number one reason that Sausalito seniors end up calling 911. Let's try to reduce the number of falls by following some important tips.

The importance of EXERCISE

Find an exercise program that incorporates balance, stability and lower body strength training. No matter what your current fitness level, you can restore balance and strength by being consistent in your exercise. Research recommends two hours per week, but any amount of time is a start. Check the calendar of classes at Sausalito Parks and Recreation for senior focused exercise classes.

The Age Friendly Sausalito Task Force was appointed by the City Council, and it has morphed into an open and inclusive Committee with multiple volunteers who choose to work on different aspects and actions to help create an ever more Age Friendly Community in which to grow up and grow old. SAUSALITO VILLAGE CELEBRATES TEN YEARS!

The national Village movement started in the Beacon Hill area of Boston in 1999 and has since become an international phenomenon with nearly 350 Villages worldwide. In the Bay Area alone we have nearly 30 and in California, nearly 60.

Sausalito Village began to form after some of its founding members read about Beacon Hill Village in the *New York Times* and related to what they said—they were determined to take control of their own futures while remaining rooted in their neighborhoods. Besty Stroman spearheaded the campaign to create Sausalito Village with a strong and dedicated group of volunteers. At the outset, Sausalito was part of a 'hub and spoke model' under Marin Villages. After a year the decision was made to become a stand alone Village as well as a 501(c)(3) non profit. Marin Villages continues to actively manage villages in six cities in Marin County.

All Villages have common themes—they are membership-driven, grassroots and generally non profits. They all have the goals of positively impacting isolation, interdependence, health and purpose of their individual members to reduce overall cost of care. Beyond those common themes, each Village bases their programs and services on the needs of its members. As you can imagine, urban and rural areas have very different needs.

Sausalito Village is celebrating 10 years of having its doors open, but let's remember the years of prior planning by the founding members. To commemorate the special anniversary, the current Board of Directors unanimously voted to make a donation to Sausalito Beautiful to purchase a small grove of trees at MLK Park. The trees will be dedicated to all of Sausalito Village members and volunteers no longer with us. Going forward, Sausalito Village will purchase one new tree each year in memory of members and volunteers who pass away during that year.

Since 2011, the Sausalito VDM Ops Council has been mentoring the women of AGEP (the Spanish acronym for their group), through programs designed to empower them to think, act and perform like the strong business women of North America.

The women stayed with local "home stay" families, who chauffeured, fed, pampered and taxied their guests every day. The New Ice House Plaza is Open! The Sausalito Historical Society dedicated the new Ice House Plaza on Saturday, October 26. Members of SHS processed from the Exhibit Room at City Hall to the Ice House, where they celebrated with the Sausalito community. The celebration included a "Golden Spike" ceremony commemorating Sausalito's railroad history.

The Ice House was built as a cold storage hold for the railroad in the 1880s. It was moved to Caledonia Street in the early 1900s and used as an outlet for residents to restock their ice boxes. With the advent of electric refrigerators, the Ice House was moved again to Caledonia and Litho Streets to be used as an office. When that property went on the market in 1998, local architect Michael Rex "sold" the Ice House to the City for one dollar.

The late Phil Frank, legendary Bay Area cartoonist and former Sausalito Historical Society President, spearheaded fundraising for the relocation of the Ice House and conversion into a downtown Museum and Visitor Center in 1999.

After years of planning and fundraising, the Historical Society broke ground on the new History Plaza in January of 2019. The new plaza features a timeline commemorating significant dates in the town's history, surrounded by Heath Ceramics tiles resembling the railroad lines that once ran through

town to the Ferry Terminal, log benches designed to look like railroad ties, and platform benches surrounding the trees.

In addition to providing a shady spot for tourists and locals, the new plaza serves as an outdoor classroom for the Historical Society's Schools' Program, which teaches Sausalito history to third grade students from Willow Creek Academy and Bayside/MLK Academy.

Our donor wall displays the names of the many individuals, foundations, corporations and community groups who helped fund the plaza. A life-size bronze statue of Phil Frank, previously housed in the Historical Society's rotating exhibit room on the third floor of City Hall, has been permanently installed in the plaza. Rumor has it that rubbing Bruce (that's the raven perched on his shoulder) will bring good luck.

DESEGREGATION, UNIFICATION, AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

We are making some important progress in our efforts to comply with the Desegregation settlement with the Attorney General's office. We are proud to announce that Janelle Scott, Ph.D. has agreed to be our Monitor, per the requirement of the settlement, for our desegregation efforts, and the Board of Trustees approved her contract. Janelle Scott is an Associate Professor at the University of California, Berkeley in the Graduate School of Education and African American Studies Department. She earned a Ph.D. in Education Policy from the University of California, Los Angeles Graduate School of Education and Information Studies, and a B.A. in Political Science from the University of California, Berkeley. Prior to earning her doctorate, she taught elementary school in Oakland, Calif.

Her research explores the relationship between education, policy, and equality of opportunity, and centers on three related policy strands: the racial politics of public education, the politics of school choice, marketization, and privatization, and the role of elite and community-based advocacy in shaping public education. Her work has appeared in several edited books and journals, including the *Peabody Journal of Education*, *Educational Policy*, *American Educational Research Journal*, and *Harvard Educational Review*. She is the editor of *School choice and diversity: What the evidence says* (2005, Teachers College Press). Now that we have our Monitor in place we can make some rapid progress in complying with the judgement.

I am also pleased to announce a consortium of amazing partners that will support is in creating the counseling program also mandated by the settlement. Representatives from COMPASS the career and college counseling program in Marin, 10,000 Degrees, Dominican College, University of San Francisco, CalStateTeach, Marin Promise Partnership and the Marin County Office of Education had a historic first partnership meeting this week to collaboratively develop our career and college counseling program and partner on the creation of a pipeline of teachers of color to staff the

Sausalito Marin City School District, Tamalpais Union High School District, and Mill Valley School District.

We had two amazing Unification town hall meetings the first at Bayside MLK and the second at Willow Creek Academy. We had an overwhelming and positive response from both events with approximately 150 attendees. They were productive and constructive events that allowed people who have been in conflict in the past to sit together at the same table to create a vision for a unified future in a safe and civil fashion. These town halls are critically important first step on our pathway to unification.

Our next steps will be to form workgroups from the folks that committed to being on the workgroups, supporting their formation and their work with time and resources. A three-hour courageous conversation training for all workgroup members will take place the third week of November, along with a menu of other volunteer capacity building workshops that can be accessed over the course of the next few months. Work groups will meet over the next two months and then draft a final report of their workgroups recommendations that will be reviewed by the community before a final report of recommendations are submitted to the SMCS and WCA Board of Trustees in January. These recommendations will inform the Comprehensive Education Plan mandated by the settlement with the Attorney General and our the development of our three year LCAP (Local Control Accountability Plan). Please join us at our upcoming town hall meetings the week of November 18-22 (time and location TBD) for our next Desegregation and Unification Town Hall meetings. Last year's California Assessment of Student Performance and Progress CAASPP scores are publicly available at caaspp-elpac.cde.ca.gov/caaspp/. I invite you to visit and check our academic progress. We still have a lot of work to do, particularly in overall school achievement and with English Language Learners. I am happy to report that Bayside MLK outperformed the state and other schools in our enrollment in ELA and Math for African American students. We recently approved and English Language Learner Master Plan and I anticipate making rapid growth in achievement with our English Language Learner students.





On the Sausalito campus, children grow, learn in two languages, climb and run, race soapboxes, go kayaking, acquire coding skills (in preschool!), develop an appreciation for good food with some of the best local chefs, cultivate their garden “Califleurie,” work with artists in residence, master the stage with their theater teacher, run radio shows, and so much more!

The Lycée Français de San Francisco (LFSF)

THE LFSF BILINGUAL PROGRAM IN SAUSALITO IS BECOMING A DESTINATION.

Something interesting is happening!

The LFSF admissions team at the international French school in Sausalito is meeting with a growing number of families moving to Marin in search of a different lifestyle. These families tend to have young children and bring a richer diversity to the North Bay. In fact, the French immersion school opened a new class this fall. *La Petite Ecole*, tailored for age two children, now welcomes 28 young students who represent eight different nationalities and seven ethnicities!

The Sausalito open campus is very attractive to prospective parents. It is safely tucked away, all on one level, filled with light, and rich in green and open spaces. In fact, even families who live in San Francisco make the choice to send their kids to Sausalito: “We could have opted to go to the city campus (on Ashbury street) but we liked the Sausalito location so much, we opted to confirm our enrollment in Marin!” says Karen Tussiot, whose son Tom started in *La Petite Ecole* last year .

LFSF has been repetitively voted by Bay Area parents as the best immersion school in San Francisco and Marin. The Sausalito campus welcomes about 200 students from age two to Grade five. Students who make the choice to continue with this exceptional program enjoy many opportunities to learn openly and globally in Middle and High School on the Ortega at 19th Avenue campus in San Francisco. Their educational journey, started in Sausalito, opens to a world of opportunities.

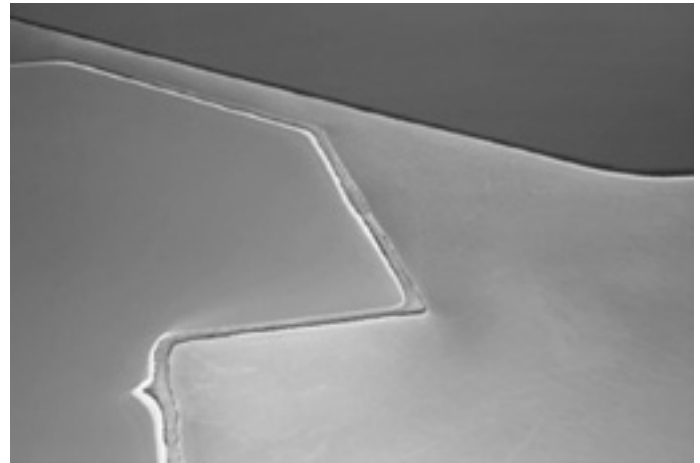

Art Exhibition: The San Francisco Bay Salt Ponds

Opens November 19, 2019 at the Bay Model Visitor Center

A new exhibition by Bill Peters opens at the Bay Model Visitor Center, Sausalito, CA on November 19, 2019 and is on display through January 25, 2020. The exhibition features 21 images of the salt ponds, sloughs and wetlands at the south end of San Francisco Bay.

The exhibition titled “When Water Dreams” presents Peters’ large-scale, aerial, color images. The images are infused with the graphic power and emotional sensibilities of formalist abstract art and color field painting.



“When Water Dreams”

Visitors will be surprised when they look at this work because at first glance it appears fully abstract – indistinguishable from paintings. On closer inspection clues like roads, boats, birds, vehicles and vegetation reveal the work as photographs of landscapes and waterscapes.

The shoreline of San Francisco Bay is a crucible where the human forces that work on land and water intersect with nature. Peters says, “I’m pleased to show this work at the Bay Model Visitor Center because of the fundamental role the Bay Model has played in understanding how to responsibly manage San Francisco Bay. Over the decade from 2009 through 2019, when I have photographed from helicopters over the Bay, I’ve been encouraged to see the construction of extensive wetlands habitat restoration projects and learn of major efforts to preserve the Bay.”

Peters is an international visual artist who has had over thirty exhibitions. His work is represented by galleries in the United States and Canada, shown in museums, and is included in the Province of Alberta’s collection.

Please plan to attend the exhibition’s opening reception from 1 pm to 3 pm on Saturday November 23rd. The reception will feature an artist’s talk and a brief presentation about the science of the Bay.

Rotary Club of Sausalito

Chartered in June 1948, the Rotary Club of Sausalito has been an integral part of the civic and charitable life of Sausalito for 71 years. Sausalito Rotary has been the driving force in Senior Housing in the city and has initiated, completed a host of community projects and been a leader in global humanitarian efforts

The Club is the sponsor of three 501(c)3 nonprofit corporations including:

1. the Rotary Housing Corp, which developed, constructed and manages two senior housing communities offering below market rate apartments to seniors in the community. Currently the rental rates are approximately half of the market rents in Sausalito.
2. The Rotary Club of Sausalito Educational Scholarship Fund, which provides vocational scholarships to deserving students. Many of these students are single mothers seeking a better life for their children.
3. Rotary Club of Sausalito Charitable Foundation, which holds annual fund-raising events that benefit the community and global humanitarian efforts.

The Club's local efforts have resulted in the construction of Marinship Park, the improvements of bus stops, signage programs, walking paths, cleaning and improving parks and helping citizens with various household tasks. RCS also holds an annual Thanksgiving luncheon for seniors in Sausalito and Marin City. Currently, the Rotary Club is the sponsor of a \$400,000 grant application to restore the fishing pier next to the Trident restaurant.

Internationally, the Club is partnering with the Rotary Club of Hoedspruit, South Africa to provide funding for a woman's health clinic in the Kruger area of South Africa to provide cervical and breast cancer screening for low income women. Many of these women are refugees from Mozambique and Zimbabwe and have no access to health care.

RCS holds two major fundraising events during the year – parking at the Sausalito Art Festival and an annual Gala, which honors and contributes funds to non-Rotarian nonprofits in Sausalito. The gala has provided needed funds to the Sausalito Historical Society, Sausalito Beautiful and the Sausalito Sister Cities organization. This year's Gala is in partnership with the Sausalito Woman's Club to be held in April 2020. All proceeds from these events are donated to our humanitarian efforts, locally and internationally.

The Rotary Club of Sausalito meets every Thursday at noon at the Sausalito Yacht Club. The cost for lunch is \$20 and the public is invited to attend. 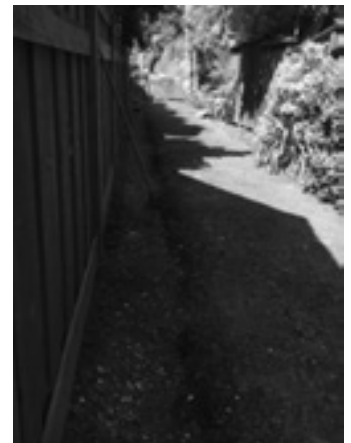
Our usual work days are the first Saturday of the month. With the rainy season (hopefully) upon us, we are currently preparing to go into hibernation until March.

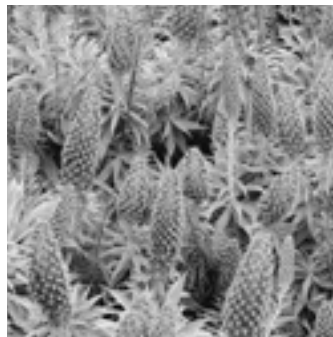
Sausalito Beautiful

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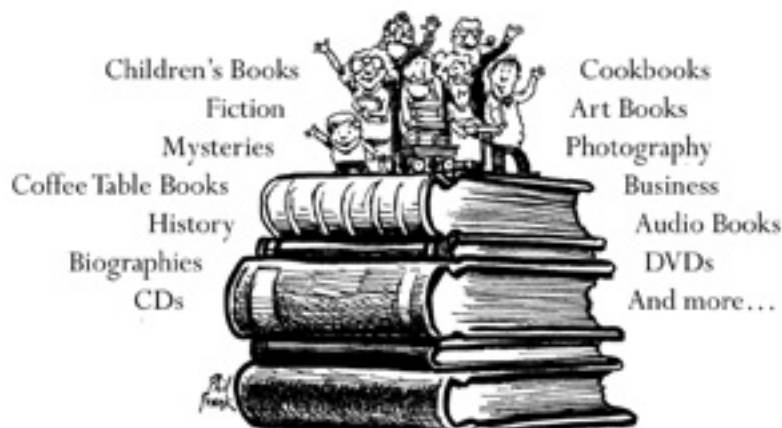
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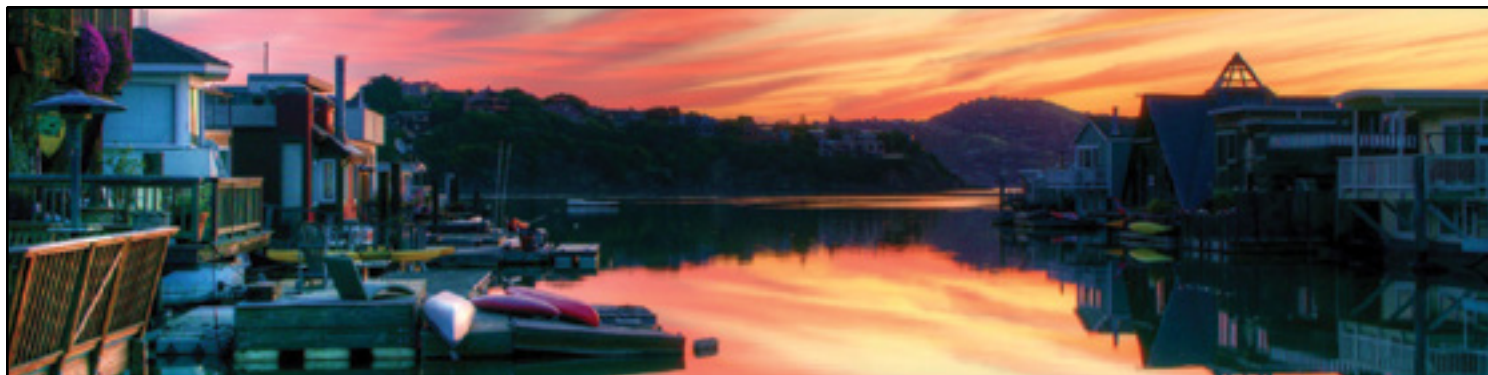
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
