## Library Services

### Library Email Newsletters

There's a lot going on at the Sausalito Library! To help local residents stay on top of things, the library has two email newsletters, one covering all library programs and services, the other focused entirely on children's and young adult services. ### Get a Library Card Without Visiting the Library

Online registration for a full-access library card is available for Marin County residents aged 16 years or older. When you apply online, you'll get immediate access to popular digital services like movies from Kanopy and e-books from OverDrive. A valid credit card with a Marin County billing address is required for address verification purposes only. Your credit card will not be charged. To obtain a library card, go to the Sausalito Library webpage and look for "Get a Library Card" under About Us.

### E-Books and E-Audiobooks

The Sausalito Library offers a huge online collection of popular electronic books and e-audiobooks for adults and children through the OverDrive service. If you're not familiar with these resources, please look for the OverDrive button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage or download OverDrive's Libby app to your mobile device. A large collection of popular audiobooks is also available on the Hoopla platform (see below). If you need extra assistance, we are available to help you get set up on your smartphone, tablet, laptop, iPad, Kindle, or e-reading device. ### Streaming Movies and More with Kanopy and Hoopla

The Sausalito Library offers two streaming video services that are free to Sausalito residents. Kanopy ([sausalito.kanopystreaming.com](http://sausalito.kanopystreaming.com)) is a collection of thousands of independent, classic, documentary, and foreign films and television shows, including Paramount classics and films from the Criterion

Collection of world cinema. Think of it as a free version of Netflix. Hoopla ([www.hoopladigital.com](http://www.hoopladigital.com)) features an eclectic selection of Hollywood and independent movies, as well as comics, e-books, music, and e-audiobooks. Both Kanopy and Hoopla can be accessed with your Sausalito library card via app, the library website, or the web addresses above. If you have any trouble using Kanopy, Hoopla, or any of the other digital collections offered by the Sausalito Library, please contact City Librarian Abbot Chambers at [achambers@sausalito.gov](mailto:achambers@sausalito.gov) or **415-289-4123**.

### New York Times Online

Did you know that you can get free online access to the *New York Times* through the library? By obtaining a special code via the library website and creating an account with the New York Times using your email address, you can receive a 24-hour unlimited-access pass. Just look for the *New York Times* button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage to get started. There is no limit to the number of times you can generate a 24-hour pass. The service will work for smartphones and tablets, as well as laptop and desktop computers. ### High-Speed Internet

The Sausalito Library's free public internet service went from slow to blazing fast in 2017, when the library connected to CalREN, the California Research and Education Network. At the library's public internet stations, where download speeds had previously been in the range of 5 to 10 megabits per second (Mbps), users now see speeds topping out at 500 Mbps. The library's free wireless network (called "library") has also gotten a big speed boost, to over 100 Mbps. Some mobile devices may see slower speeds due to hardware limitations.

### Online Archive of Sausalito Newspapers

Thanks to grants from the Sausalito Library Foundation and the Sausalito Historical Society, the library can offer online access to digital archives of the Sausalito News from 1885 to 1966 and the Sausalito Marin Scope from 1971 to 2010. The archive may be searched and browsed via the California Digital Newspaper Collection, which is maintained by the University of California, Riverside. You can find the archives on the web at [cdnc.ucr.edu](http://cdnc.ucr.edu), or via the Services section of the library website. Digital archives of the Marin Scope from 2011 to present are available to users inside the Sausalito Library.

### Museum Passes

Discover & Go is an online service you can use to reserve and print free and discount passes to Bay Area museums and cultural institutions like the Asian Art Museum, the Exploratorium, and the California Academy of Sciences. Look for the Discover & Go button in the Digital Collections area of the library homepage to access the service. Please note that tickets for popular museums may not be available unless booked well in advance. ### Free Admission Tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor

In addition to the Discover & Go online service, the library offers free general admission tickets to the de Young Museum and the Legion of Honor in San Francisco. Every adult library card holder living in Sausalito is entitled to one ticket per year (each ticket admits two adults). Tickets are purchased through grants from the Friends of the Library and the Sausalito Art Festival Foundation.

### Borrow a California State Parks Vehicle Day Pass

The library has two “Golden Poppy” California State Parks vehicle day passes available to the public. The passes provide free vehicle admission and parking at over one hundred state parks, beaches, and recreation areas, including area parks like Mount Tamalpais, China Camp, and Samuel P. Taylor. To borrow a pass, look for one of the Golden Poppy cases in the central display area of the Sausalito Public Library. Bring the case to the service desk with your library card, and you can check out a storage bag containing the pass and information about California State Parks. Passes circulate for seven days and are not renewable. To ensure that a pass is available and save yourself a trip to the library, call the Reference Desk at 415-289-4121 — if a pass is available, we can set it aside for you for up to two hours.

### Ancestry

The popular genealogy software tool Ancestry is available for use on the library’s public computers. Ancestry features censuses, vital records, immigration records, family histories, military records, court and legal documents, directories, photos, maps, and more. ### Home Delivery Program

The Sausalito Library offers a home delivery service of library materials using volunteer drivers from Call a Ride for Sausalito Seniors (CARSS). Participation in this program is free and open to residents of Sausalito and the floating home community who are 60 years of age or older, and to younger adults with a disability. If you are interested in having books, movies, or audiobooks delivered to your door, you will need to fill out a short application and sign a liability waiver, in addition to being a library card holder. All CARSS drivers have been vetted by Verified Volunteers. The service is available Monday through Friday, 10am to 2pm. ## URBAN EDIBLE GARDENS

Sausalito's climate allows for lush vegetative growth with southeastern sun exposure most of the year, 33 inches of annual rainfall and a rain shadow cast by the Marin Headlands, which brings additional moisture to the area. Thick vegetation and a large canopy of trees throughout the city builds rich soil. Given these ideal conditions for growth, we need to start shifting our conventional, ornamental landscapes into organic edible urban gardens. Climate change, food security and community resiliency are the driving forces behind urban farming. Historically urban planning has created a strong divide between urban and rural interface. Current interest in sustainable living encourages us to bridge this divide and experiment in our own back yards. By doing so we are becoming connected to the soil and to each other, while gaining a deeper awareness of our food systems.

How do we start? Edible plants are easy to grow at any scale and in almost any space: a pot, planter box or raised beds. We are lucky to have great resources near by. Sonoma Compost, located in West Marin, has organic soil amendments, path covers and top soils for your garden at an affordable price. The Seed Bank in Petaluma is a great source of heirloom seeds. There are also a large number of community gardens in Marin and Sonoma County that provide workshops in composting, garden design and integrated pest management. You have inspiration and mentorship in edible gardens all around you!

The two school gardens located at Sausalito's Martin Luther King campus, tended by Lycée Francais de San Francisco and New Village School are an inspiration. Both fenced gardens have designs based in permaculture and organic farming. There you can view best practices in sheet mulching; spacing of diverse dwarf fruit trees and raised veggie beds; seasonal vegetable variety and plant rotation. Vines climbing their fencing creating a natural screen and giving life to the fence structure. The number of dwarf trees gives diversity of acclimatized fruit trees and edible shrubs.

Companion plants, which support beneficiary insects, and medicinal herbs are great to include in your garden design. By attracting the right insects that prey on common pests we can keep our edible gardens pesticide free. Marigolds, nasturtiums and yarrow, for example, are amazing groundcovers that are beautiful, easy to grow, attract pollinators, and provide soil and moisture retention. Marigolds and nasturtiums can bring color and spicy full flavor to a garden salad and yarrow makes a valuable medicinal tea for cold, flu and fever. We can grow vegetables such as tree kale, artichokes, cauliflower, cabbage, rainbow chard and fava beans as part of an all-year-long landscape that are interesting to look at and nutrient dense.

Springtime is a great time to get started transforming your home garden into an edible landscape. In your backyard you can enjoy the beauty of reducing your carbon footprint and regaining self sufficiency. I invite you to visit your closest community garden and talk to your neighbors.

### Where Do Organic Materials Go?



Two-thirds of the daily solid waste stream are organics. These materials can be diverted and used to make soil amendment products.

Organics are comprised of elements including yard waste, food scrap, food soiled paper, cardboard and compostable bags.

To conserve landfill space and benefit the environment, organics are transferred to a processing facility where they go through a series of steps to become compost. When the materials are delivered to the organics processing facility, they are ground up and placed in static piles.

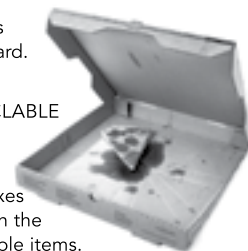
Next, the compostable materials are moved into what are called "windrows". They are turned every few days and watered down to control the heat generated by the decomposition process. Organics are processed for a total of 50-60 days, once a windrow reaches a temperature of about 145 degrees it is ready to be screened.

During the screening process non-compostables such as glass and plastic are removed to prevent contamination of the finished compost. The finished product is a rich soil material that resembles ground coffee and can be sold for use by local residents, gardeners and farmers.

### Are Pizza Boxes Recyclable?

There's a widespread misconception pizza boxes go in your recycling bin because they're cardboard.

- Pizza boxes are made from corrugated cardboard, which is **NO LONGER RECYCLABLE** when soiled with food, oil and grease.
- **ONLY CLEAN PAPER and CARDBOARD** can be made into new products. Dirty boxes create a larger problem when it's placed in the recycling container, contaminating recyclable items.
- Make sure your pizza boxes are put in the **GREEN ORGANIC WASTE** container, **NOT THE BLUE RECYCLING CONTAINER.**



### Proper Battery Disposal: Reduce Fire Risk NO Batteries in the Recycling, Organics or Trash Container!

If disposed of incorrectly batteries release toxins in the air and ground, poisoning the environment. When crushed they can combust causing significant fire hazards. Practicing safe battery habits:

- ALL BATTERIES should be removed before disposing of any device, power tools, cameras, games, toys, flashlights, hearing aids, etc.
- Buy & use rechargeable batteries and battery chargers.
- Charge batteries marked rechargeable to avoid toxic leaks or ruptures.
- Remove batteries from seldom-used devices to avoid toxic leaks.
- Don't mix old batteries with new ones.
- Don't mix battery types, or rechargeable with non-rechargeable batteries, in the same device.
- Don't place batteries or devices with batteries, where they could overheat.
- Don't open or tamper with battery cases.

## Sausalito Police Department

### FRAUDULENT IRS CALLS

Tax season is upon us again and the Sausalito Police Department has been contacted by several Sausalito residents who have received telephone calls from scammers claiming to be from the IRS. Unfortunately, this is a common scam and continues to be an issue even after tax season is over. Here are some tips directly from the IRS website ([www.irs.gov](http://www.irs.gov)) on how to identify a fictitious call from the IRS and how to proceed:

The IRS would like to remind citizens that these scams are easily detected when looking for the right clues. Here are five common approaches these scammers will often use and any one of these should be a warning sign of a possible scam.

The IRS will never:

- Call to demand immediate payment, nor will they call about a tax debt without prior written notification
- Demand that you pay taxes without providing information on an appeals process and payment plan information, etc.
- Require you to use a specific payment method, such as a prepaid debit card
- Ask for credit or debit card numbers over the phone
- Threaten to enlist local police or other law enforcement agencies to have you arrested for not paying

If you get a phone call from someone claiming to be from the IRS and demanding immediate payment for a tax debt owed, here's what you should do:

- If you owe taxes or think you might owe, call the IRS at **1-800-829-1040**. The IRS can help you determine if there is in fact a debt owed and how to proceed.
- If you are certain you do not owe a tax debt, report the incident to the Treasury Inspector General for Tax Administration (TIGTA) at **1-800-366-4484** or at [www.tigta.gov](http://www.tigta.gov).
- You may also file a complaint using the FTC Complaint Assistant (<https://www.ftccomplaintassistant.gov/>); choose "Other" and then "Imposter Scams." If the complaint involves someone impersonating the IRS, include the words "IRS Telephone Scam" in the notes.

## Community Safety Disaster Preparedness Committee

### EVACUATIONS

In the midst of seasonal storms, we should be preparing for the possibility of heavy rains and landslides like we've had the last two winters. Last year's Valentine's Day Landslide could not have been prevented by residents or homeowners. Residents and homeowners can take property protection measures, and have an Evacuation Plan, for evacuating from their apartment, home, or business, for a landslide or other disasters such as earthquakes, fires, wildfires or heavy storms.

Every family and businesses should have an evacuation plan, which includes a list of items to take with them, along with a GO Bag for each person and pet. Here's a suggested list:

#### 5-Minute Notice List of items to take with you:

- Prescription Medications
- Eyeglasses, Extra Glasses, Contacts, Extra Contacts
- Wallet/checkbook/credit cards
- Safe deposit key
- Laptop/Notebook/Computer and backup hard drive, and cords
- Cell Phone and charger and cords
- Pets/leashes/their food and medications
- Go Bag
- Jacket or Sweatshirt
- Heavy Shirt and Pants
- Socks and good Shoes
- Flashlight Water

#### 15-Minute Notice List:

- 5 Minute List items, plus:
- Cages for pets
- Family keepsakes
- Contact lists and policy numbers for insurance, bank, etc.
- Important Family Photos and/or Records
- Additional photos
- Artwork (most important pieces)

#### 1-Hour Notice List:

- 5- and 15-Minute List items, plus:
- Turn of gas (at the meter)
- Tax Records
- Contents of safe (if one is owned)
- Changes of clothes and shoes
- Toiletries
- Business records
- Home or business property records\*
- Artwork/other visual valuables
- Tent/sleeping bags
- Suitcase/duffel bag with survival supplies



\*Take a video of the contents of each room of the house and/or business and store in your safe deposit box, home safe, Cloud, or on a memory stick/card within reach of quick access if needed. These days you could also keep all the paperwork items in Cloud storage.

You might want to keep a list of any contact numbers, insurance policies, etc. that give you access to records verses actual policies. Alternatively, you can scan everything into your computer and download it to a thumb drive for quick access.

### Get Out and Go Bags

There are two types of bags recommended, one for getting out and one for going. Get Out Bags are bags you would grab as you get out during an emergency. They would contain the basics listed above and clothing you might need to change out of your pajamas and/or an outfit for a night or two away. You would want good shoes or boots for evacuating (in case it's by foot), good warm sweatshirt and/or jacket for night or day cold weather. You might also include gloves and hat or caps, to keep your head warm. Also consider water, cereal bars, etc. as well as a small first aid kit.

Go Bags with Disaster Supplies, are for getting out and being on your own for 72-hours or more and include first aid, medications, food, water, and other items needed when you must be out of the house on your own.

As we approach the time when the clocks Spring Forward, we used to recommend residents check the batteries in their smoke, fire, and CO2 detectors. The committee has passed out free batteries at the Easter Parade and Party at Dunphy Park, but no more, since we should all have purchased and installed new detectors. Smoke Detectors now have a built in 10-year battery. The CSDPC and Southern Marin Fire District recommend changing out old smoke detectors with new ones with the built in 10-year battery.

Sausalito's Community Safety Disaster Preparedness Committee has just finished updating the city's 2020 Citizen's Guide to Disaster Preparedness. This 28 page booklet may not make for romantic reading, but the valuable tips it offers on helping you, your family, your neighborhood and your co-workers get ready for the potentials of fire, flood, earthquake, power shutdowns and emergency evacuations are sure to help touch your heart with the warm glow of peace of mind.

The 2020 Citizens Guide is available on the city's website at [www.sausalito.gov/guide](http://www.sausalito.gov/guide), but this detailed document is informative enough that you just might want to have a hard-copy handy for when the power goes out – and it will. Printed Guides will be available soon, and will be handed out locally by members of the CSDPC at a variety of locations. We've been told that only 1 in 10 people have taken steps to prepare for the next emergency. This St. Valentine's Day, it's time for a Long-Term Relationship—with Disaster Preparedness!

### SAUSALITO VILLAGE CELEBRATES TEN YEARS!

The national Village movement started in the Beacon Hill area of Boston in 1999 and has since become an international phenomenon with nearly 350 Villages worldwide. In the Bay Area alone we have nearly 30 and in California, nearly 60.

Sausalito Village began to form after some of its founding members read about Beacon Hill Village in the *New York Times* and related to what they said—they were determined to take control of their own futures while remaining rooted in their neighborhoods. Besty Stroman spearheaded the campaign to create Sausalito Village with a strong and dedicated group of volunteers. At the outset, Sausalito was part of a ‘hub and spoke model’ under Marin Villages. After a year the decision was made to become a stand alone Village as well as a 501(c)(3) non profit. Marin Villages continues to actively manage villages in six cities in Marin County.

All Villages have common themes—they are membership-driven, grassroots and generally non profits. They all have the goals of positively impacting isolation, interdependence, health and purpose of their individual members to reduce overall cost of care. Beyond those common themes, each Village bases their programs and services on the needs of its members. As you can imagine, urban and rural areas have very different needs.

Sausalito Village is celebrating 10 years of having its doors open, but let’s remember the years of prior planning by the founding members. As a result of our strong relationship with our oldest Sister City, Viña del Mar, Chile, we have a separate project under The Susan Roe Foundation, Inc., as we are building a Marine Anemales/Mammal Research Center on the coast of Chile. More about that project in future articles.

## SAKAIDE, JAPAN

2019 marked our 31st year of the Sausalito-Sakaide Sister City Program, celebrating our ever-strengthening international friendship and mutual cultural respect and understanding between Japan and the United States. Through the Sausalito-Sakaide Sister City Program, the City of Sausalito sent 11 high school students from Sausalito to Sakaide, Japan for 10 days of cultural and educational experiences that positively changed their lives forever. By the end of their stay in Sakaide, judging from the clinging hugs and restrained sobbing, they might as well have been family, and that's the point of our program. We bring people from opposite sides of the world together to form deep connections that will last a lifetime.

During their 10 days in Sakaide and Japan, our student delegates engaged in a wide range of diplomatic, educational, cultural, and physical activities from touring one of the longest suspension bridges in the world to meeting Sakaide City officials to practicing sport sword fighting to kayaking in Fuchu Lake, all in steamy Sakaide Summer heat! At the end of each day, the students return to their host families to spend some quality time together, usually over home cooked meals. It's no wonder why these students become so attached.

Sausalito and Sakaide have fostered an official friendship that has lasted for over 30 years through the Sausalito-Sakaide Sister City Program. Every year, one city sends a group of high school students to the other, alternating between years. In 2019, families in Sakaide City hosted students from Sausalito and, this summer, we will welcome a delegation of high school students from Sakaide, Japan to have their own life-changing immersive cultural experiences. ## VIÑA DEL MAR, CHILE

We are spending the next months working on our 2020 fundraiser. More details to follow with dates and what we think will be a fun and exciting adventure. Participating in our 2020 fundraiser is a positive way to show your support of the cultural and exchange programs that each of our sister councils create and carry out. In case you weren't aware, our programs are so successful, that nationally we have been recognized as #1 in the country for cities our size.

The focus of our exchange with Viña Del Mar is with a group of approximately 50 women from the Viña Del Mar/Valparaiso region who network, support and conduct business with each other. Since 2011, the Sausalito VDM Ops Council has been mentoring the women of AGEPE (the Spanish acronym for their group), through programs, workshops and hands-on advice, all designed to empower them to think, act and perform like the strong business women of North America.

Each year, a group of seven AGEPE women visit Sausalito, or a group from our Operations Council goes to Viña. 2020 is our year to head south, so we'll be sending a delegation to Viña in early November. The year 2019 will be remembered as one of particular challenges throughout Chile. There was political strife, socio-economic unrest, and more wildfires affecting both wilderness and populated areas. A Federal election in April of this year could bring more changes, along with the municipal elections in October in Viña Del Mar.

The women of AGEPE need our support now more than ever as their businesses have seen sharp declines, and several have even closed. Our program for this 2020 visit is being designed to address these challenges, in addition to our continued series of business and personal empowerment.

We'll have more information on our 2020 program in the next issue of Sausalito Magazine. Meanwhile take a look at some of the photos from our 2019 exchange here in Sausalito, when we visited 18 Sausalito businesses, volunteered at the Sausalito Arts Festival, and hosted 8 Chilean women showing them the American way of life. 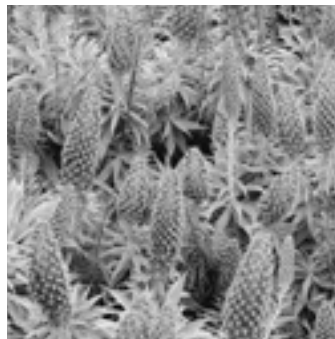

## Come Sail, Explore and Learn with Us!

Looking for a unique on-the-water experience? Brigantine Matthew Turner was built here in Sausalito from the keel up with nearly 200,000 hours of volunteer labor. Its design is based the 19th Century brigantine “Galilee” built by Matthew Turner, the most prolific shipbuilder in North American history. It is 132 feet long, carries up to 70 passengers on deck, and sleeps 30 below. Be among the first to sail during its inaugural Spring 2020 season.

Schooner Seaward has recently been refurbished and returns in April from a voyage to Mexico. It is 82 feet long, carries up to 40 passengers on deck, and sleeps 12 below. Over the past several years, Seaward has provided thousands of students and life-long learners with outstanding educational experiences.

These tall ships are operated by Call of the Sea, a charitable non-profit organization, and sail from the Army Corps of Engineers pier at the Bay Model Visitors Center on the Sausalito waterfront. A variety of sailing options are available, ranging from 3-hour Bay explorations to overnight and multi-day voyages in the Gulf of the Farallons and Monterey Bay sanctuaries. You may choose from several on board programs, including team building/sail-training, maritime heritage and ocean science. Ticket prices are reasonable, covering the cost of the sail and just a few dollars more to provide scholarships for those who would not otherwise be able to get out on the water.

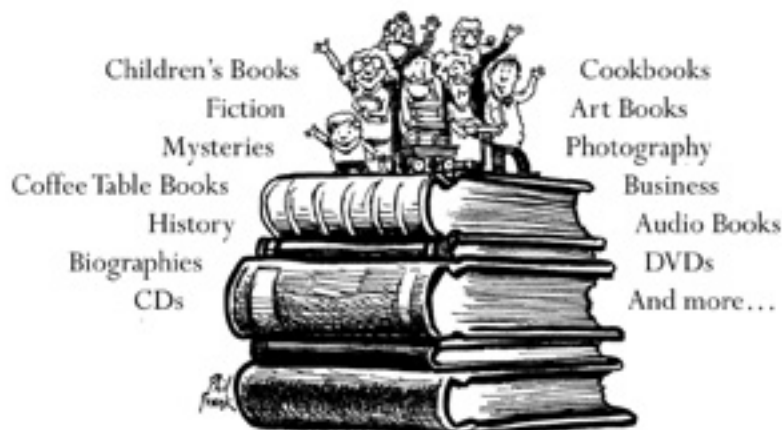

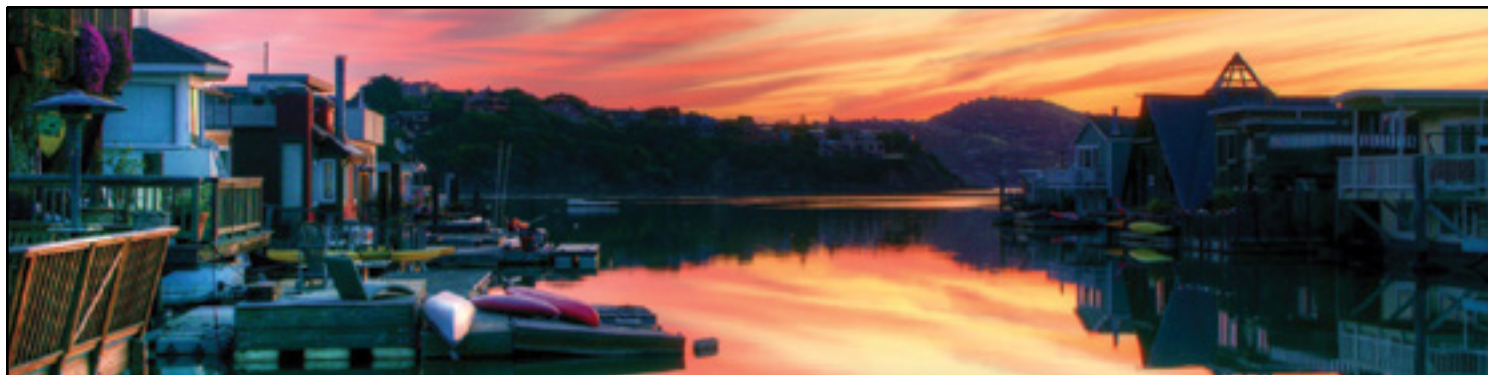
