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PUBLIC HEARINGS

5A. Public Hearing on Proposed Sanitary Sewer Fee Effective 2009-10:

- 1) Conduct Public Hearing of the proposed sanitary sewer fees, including finding that the change in sewer fees resulting from adoption of the Ordinance is statutorily exempt from the California Environmental Quality Act: and
- 2) Tally protests received; and
- 3) Introduction, and reading by title only, an Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Sausalito modifying Chapter 18.12 of the Sausalito Municipal Code, setting fees for any lawful purpose of the sewer utility, and continue item to regular meeting of June 23, 2009 for second reading and adoption (Director of Public Works Jonathon Goldman)

Director of Public Works Jonathon Goldman presented the staff report on this item. Mr. Goldman began by presenting the "team" of Grant Hoag from CDM, Tim Seufert from NBS, and Jennifer Root from The Lew Edwards Group.

Through a PowerPoint presentation, Mr. Goldman presented the process that has been followed to date and the process to be followed this evening and into the future.

Council questions followed.

Mayor Leone then opened the Public Hearing.

Mike Monsef expressed concern that the tax will create a damaging effect on the community. He also expressed concern about recent Council decisions which could have created revenue increases. Mr. Monsef concluded by noting that locals will be forced to leave because of increased fees.

Mayor Leone offered a response.

Rich Fortmann stated that he was protesting the increase. He felt that this sewer program does not address the sewer lateral issues. Mr. Fortmann also expressed concern about fee assessment equity.

Mayor Leone asked the Director of Public Works to respond to the fee equity issue.

At 7:54 pm, Councilmember Kelly left the dais.

Dane Faber noted that his concerns are many. He felt that the process that the Council was taking was like "putting the cart before the horse".

At 7:59 pm, Councilmember Kelly returned to the dais.

Mr. Faber continued, noting that the actions being taken by Council were a "piece meal" approach and that a much more comprehensive plan was needed.

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1 2 Peter Sealey felt that the Council had no option. However, he felt that had the City been working on the sewer issues over the last ten years, the City would not be facing the \$7 million expense to fix it. Mr. Sealey further noted that he, personally, was facing a 67% increase due the proposed increase and the failure of the City to have been billing properly in the past.

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Jim deRemer expressed concern about the road repairs that would follow the sewer rehab. He wanted to know if the roads would be properly repaired.

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Chuck Donald agreed with some of the previous comments; however, he felt that there was a need to solve the sewer problems now. He felt that the plan that has been outlined is the best that the City has.

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"Miki" Lang spoke about specific issues with her area and the laterals issues there. She was concerned that her neighborhood would be impacted hard because of the fee increase and the lateral issues.

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Laura Saunders voiced concern about why no action was taken before it became a disaster and the community is faced with such a large increase.

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Joan Werner noted that she is a senior citizen on a limited income and "everyone" seems to be passing the buck on". She felt that this increase is a ridiculous burden on the residents.

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Mayor Leone closed the Public Hearing and called for all protest letters to be turned in.

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Council comments followed.

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Mayor Leone called for a brief break while the protest letters were tallied.

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Mayor Leone reconvened the meeting and Deputy City Clerk Debbie Pagliaro announced that 15 protest letters had been received in the mail and five protest letters received during the public hearing (and that two of those had been received subsequent to the close of the public hearing). It was noted that there were 3,404 parcels and, therefore, an insufficient number of protests had been received in order to stop the proceedings from moving forward.

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Councilmember Kelly moved, seconded by Councilmember Pfeifer, to 1) waive full reading of the ordinance and read by title only; 2) find that the adoption of the ordinance is statutorily exempt from the California Environmental quality Act: and 3) give first reading to an Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Sausalito modifying Chapter 18.12 of the Sausalito Municipal Code, establishing sewer charges for any lawful purpose of the sewer utility, and 4) continue the item to the regular meeting of June 23, 2009 for second reading and adoption of the ordinance (the ordinance was then read by title only - An Ordinance of the City Council of the City of Sausalito Setting Fees for Sewer Services Provided by the City Effective Fiscal Year 2009-10).
