Suggestions for FY 2011-12 Prioritized Project List

Background

In past three years the City Council has approved "Prioritized Project Lists" which prioritized staff work on over 40 projects during the respective FY 2008-09, FY 2009-10, and FY 2010-11 timeframes. The Prioritized Project List approved by the Council in May 2010 is attached.

As part of the upcoming budget discussions, City staff is seeking suggestions from commissions, City volunteers, and the public on projects which should be placed on the Prioritized Project List for funding in the FY 2011-12 budget.

In order to qualify as a Prioritized Project List, the project must:

- Require at least 40 hours of staff time;
- Be one time in nature:
- Not reflect routine provisions of City services;
- Be a mandate imposed by state or federal government, or other funding agencies; or
- Be a major capital improvement.

Staff suggests the Trees and Views Committee (TVC) use the following steps in this process:

- 1. TVC provides written suggestions on new projects which should be placed on the Prioritized Project List for funding by the City Council in the upcoming FY 2011-12 budget.
- 2. Staff assembles a master list of the current projects (attached) with the projects suggested by the TVC. The TVC ranks the projects on the master list at the May 5th TVC meeting.
- 3. The City Council considers the TVC's recommendations in preparing the budget.

Request

Please provide your written suggestions of any projects which should be placed on the Prioritized Project List for funding in the FY 2011-2012 budget. These written suggestions should be forwarded to staff by April 18th in order to ensure they are included on the master list of projects to be ranked by the BAC at the next BAC meeting on May 5th.
